JOHNSON SENTENCED

Items of Interest Gathered Here TO BE HANGED NOVEMBER 25TH THANKSGIVING DAY.

> The Prisoner Evinced No Emotion When Judgment Was Pronounced - Other Proceedings in the Criminal Court-The Grand Jury's Report.

Geo. Johnson, the negro convicted of felonious assault Friday, in the Crimical Court, was yesterday morning sentenced by Judge Sutton to be hanged on Thursday, the 25th of next month (Thanksgiving Day), between the hours of 10 o'clock in the morning and 8 o'clock in the afternoon.

By 9.80 o'clock yesterday morning the court room was crowded with both black and white people, the former, however, in the majority, brought there through curiosity to hear the death sentence pronounced on Johnson.

The convicted man arrived in Court shortly before 10 o'clock, the time appointed for the reassembling of Court, and took his seat calmly in the prisoner's box, paying no heed to the large crowd which stood staring at him.

At 10.10 o'clock, when Judge Sutton accompanied by th ecourt stenographer arrived, the room was packed almost to suffocation. After the grand jury had filed their report and been discharged, Solicitor Richardson arose and announced to the Court that Geo. Johnson, convicted of felonious assault, was present, that he (|ohnson) had been given a fair trial by an intelligent jury of his countrymen, and that it was now his (the solicitor's) unpleasant duty to pray the judgment of the Court.

Johnson was commanded to stand up and slowly but calmly he responded. and Judge Sutton then pronounced the sentence of the Court in the case as follows viz-

"The jury having convicted you of one of the highest crimes known to the law, the most painful duty of my life now devolves upon me. "By your conduct you have forfeited

your life to the law which the jury by

their verdict say you have violated. "I have endeavored to give you a fair and impartial trial, and did hope that some way of escape might be found for you from the fearful consequence of your crime, but the evidence was so'direct, conclusive and overwhelming that there was but use course for the jury to follow and leave but the one remaining

duty for me now to perform. "The judgment of the Court is that the prisoner, George Johnson, be now remanded to the custody of the sheriff of New Hanover county, N. C., and by him salely kept until Thursday, the 95th day of November, 1897, and that on that day, between the hours of 10 in the forenoon and 8 in the afternoon, the said sheriff of New Hanover county, N. C., will, at such place of execution as may be appointed by law, hang the said Gao, Johnson by the neck until he is dead; and may God have mercy on your soul."

Johnson remained immovable, and showed no signs of nervousness until Judge Satton pronounced the last sentence, "and may God have mercy on your soul," when his lips parted as if to allow some atterance, but they quickly closed again and Johnson resumed his seat and his stoical appearance. After some of the crowd had cleared out of the court room, the condemned man, in custody of deputy sheriffs Gaion and Fonville, was carried back to Jail.

GRAND JURY REPORT. The grand jury submitted report as

follows Hon. T. H. Sutton, Judge of the Criminal

The grand jury for this October, 1897. term of the court, respectfully submit That they have considered forty-six bilis, of which thirty one were found to

be true, twelve not true, and three were continued or not acted upon for want of witnesses who were called but failed to answer. Three presentments were made. The public institutions under the care of the county were visited by committees from the grand jury as directed by your Honor. The jail by the foreman and accommittee, and the county home by four other members. As a resuit of the examination, we found the jail clean and well ventilated; food substantial, consisting of corn bread and salt meat, and well cooked. The meals are served only once a day, in the morning, but in quantity it is a daily allowance. The prisoners make no complaint except as to the sameness of diet. We recommend that a change in the food be made at least twice a week, and we would suggest broth, coffee or soup. The prisoners were examined privately as to the treatment accorded them by the jailor, and they spoke well of him. The number of prisoners, at the time of our visit, in jall were twenty-fourtwenty males and four females, all of whom are colored but one male, who is an imbecile and is confined for safekeeping. We were informed by the jailor that his parents intend to take him home and care for him; otherwise, we think he should be provided for at the hospital. The sick are promptly attended by the county physician. The interior walls of the jail need scraping and white wash. ing; they are very much discolored and we think the work should be done at once, as a matter of sanitation. ding is insufficient to keep the inmates warm, one cripple man having an old pad for a bed and a corn sack filled with grass for his heading. We think the home is in an unhealthy condition and should be kept cleaner. The range is out of order and is of no service, and the stove is not in good order, so the kitchen cannot be kept clean. We find the pumps out of order mates are not in use.

A PAID FIRE DEPARTMENT

If Recommended by the Local Board of Fire Underwriters May be Approved by the City Government.

Mr. J. S. Middleton, of Atlants, representing the Southeastern Tariff Association, is here for the purpose of rerating the business part of the city. Yesterday, Mr. Middleton, together with Mr. Chas. Schnibben, Chief of the Fire Department, and a committee from the local Board of Underwriters, consisting of Messrs F. H. Stedman, J. H. Boatwright and C. C. Chadbourn, conferred with Mayor S. P. Wright and Mr. W. H. Chadbourn, chairman of the Board of Audit and Finance, to discuss the pro-

posed re-rating. After some discussion it was generally agreed that it would be practicable to have a paid fire department, as under such a department the rates of insur ance would be reduced and ultimately the tax-payers would be benefitted.

On the other hand, if the volunteer system as now in use be adhered to, the rate on mercantile brick buildings will be increased 10 cents on the \$100.


