- Greenville Weekly: Mr. W. P. Clark bought a piece of land this year, and has been at work on it. The result is, he has about fifty bar rels of corn, a large lot of fodder, two 500 pound bales of cotton, over \$200 worth of tobacco on hand, a lot of peas and potatoes, etc., after already selling \$400 worth of tobacco. To make this crop he worked one old gray mule (about 23 years of age-the kind that never dies), and had the help of a boy about five months, and a little help to get in his tobacco. He had only seven acres intobacco, and two hail storms struck that. One payment on his land is due this fall, but he will make two payments. His whole crop

was less than thirty acres. This shows what can be done farming in Pitt county by men who will work.
