

LUETBERT MURDER TRIAL

Argument in the Case Begins—A Claimant for the Reward Offered for Mrs. Luetbert Put in an Appearance.

CHICAGO, February 1.—The trial of Adolph Luetbert for the murder of his wife (Louise) came to an end today, as far as the taking of testimony is concerned. Assistant State Attorney McElwain at once started in on his closing address to the jury. He argued that the argument of counsel will take up a week.

A man giving the name of Jacob Luetbert called at the central police station this afternoon and announced himself as prepared to accept the \$20,000 reward which Louise Luetbert offered for the man who had killed Mrs. Luetbert within forty-eight hours and could produce the body. He said Mrs. Luetbert was with a short distance of Chicago with friends. According to Luetbert's story, she is in Chicago but had no money. He was given a letter to the inspector Schackel, and that official not only agreed to make good the \$20,000 but had originally the \$500 additional for every day that was saved in the trial by the production of Mrs. Luetbert. A HOTEL BURNED

Six Persons Perished in the Flames—A Dozen or More Injured.

TENNESSEE'S SENATOR

Thomas B. Farley, a Free Silver Democrat, Chosen on First Ballot.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., February 1.—The Democratic caucus on the first ballot tonight nominated for Senator Thomas B. Farley, of Memphis, to fill the unexpired term of Isham O. Harris. Mr. Farley was appointed Senator by Governor Taylor. After Senator Harris' death, the ballot stood Farley, 65; McMillan, 43; Taylor, 1.
The joint convention of the two houses of the Legislature will elect Mr. Farley Senator to-morrow at noon. His term will expire March 4th, 1901. Governor Taylor is 53 years of age, one of the most prominent lawyers in Memphis, an ex-Confederate soldier and a 18 to 1 free silver Democrat.

SHORT SESSION IN SENATE.

Another Political Debate in the House—Most of the Session Devoted to Consideration of the District of Columbia Appropriation Bill.

WASHINGTON, February 1.—No business of importance was transacted by the Senate in open session today. The feature of the short session was a statement made by Senator Clark, Republican, Wyoming, as a matter of personal privilege, concerning his vote in favor of the Teller resolution.

Senator Clark had reported a dispatch from his state published in Eastern newspapers, to the effect that Henry C. Hay, chairman of the Laramie County Republican Committee, had supported an account of the vote cast by the Wyoming Senators for the Teller resolution. Senator Clark stated that so much had been said concerning the vote of Wyoming Senators that he deemed it wise to make a statement.
