JUSTICE FOWLER'S OPINION.

He Decides That Suits in Justice Bunting's Court Against the Foster Board Have Priority.

Yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock Justice J. J. Fowler rendered his de cision in the suit which was pending before him for \$200 forfeiture instituted by Mr. Jordan Branch against County Commissioners F. W. Foster and Jordan Nixon. STAR readers will remember that the suits are for holding two offices of trust and profit-County Commissioners and Board of Education-in violation of section 1870 of the code.

The issues on which Justice Fowler's opinion was reserved were the plea of former conviction entered by the defence and the amendment of the complaint in striking out the name of the State as a prosecutor. He held yesterday afternoon that in amending the complaint it made the institution of the suit date from the amendment and therefore gave the suits before Justice Bunting priority which would sustain the plea of former conviction entered by the defence. However attorneys for the prosecution gave notice of an appeal from Justice Fow-

As the matter now stands in the nagistrate's court the judgments obtained against Col. Foster, F. J Dempsey and Jordan Nixon for \$200 each before Justice Bunting in favor of Mr. Nicholas Morris held good.

COTTON ACREAGE.

Decrease in the United States Estimated at Five and a Half Per Cent.

Messrs. Latham, Alexander & Co. New York, estimate the decrease in cotton acreage in the United States for 1898 at 51 per cent., or 1,335,000 bales less than last year and the average planting of the crop about the same as last year, when the planting was late. The decrease in North Carolina is estimated at seven per cent, and in South Carolina five per cent. The estimate is based upon 2,488 replies to some 3,500 letters, of average date May 26th, addressed to cotton commission merchants, brokers, banks and bankers making advances, and responsible planters.

count of cold weather, overflow in the Arkansas and White rivers and poor stands, as a whole, the crop can be said to be in a fair average condition as compared with other seasons of the same date."
