Steam Pipe Burst Just as the Vessel Was Leaving Her Pier in New York for Galveston.

New York, December 3.-Six members of the crew of the Mallory Line steamship Alamo were killed to night by the bursting of a steam pipe while the vessel lay at her pier in East river. The Alamo has only recently been discharged from transport service for the government and is fresh from Roache's yard, where she received a thorough overhauling, including, it is said, new steam pipes and boilers. She was scheduled to sail at 1.30 P. M. yesterday for Galveston via Key West, but was detained in order to place on board an unusual quantity of freight.

She carried thirty passengers At the time of the accident, about 7 o'clock, the ship had cast off her lines and the tug boat President had her line taut to assist the Alamo into mid-stream. Her engines had made but two or three revolutions when the explosion came. The flooring of the deck immediately over the engine room was torn up and steam poured through the open seams in clouds. TEMPORARY HALT IN NEGOTIATIONS.

Notable Dinner to Distinguished American Forces Take Charge It is Believed, However, That The Treaty Will be Signed This Week.

STARS AND STRIPES HOISTED PROBABLE CAUSE OF DELAY.

Germany is Negotiating For the Purchase of the Caroline Islands and the Spaniards Are Anxious to Make a Good Trade.

By Cable to the Morning Star. Paris, Dec. 3.—There was no joint meeting this morning.

The report from Berlin that Germany is negotiating for the purchase of several quarters, although Count Von Munster-Ladenburg, the German ambassador here, informed a correspondent of the Associated Press that he knew nothing at all about the matter. The American commissioners are inclined to believe the report and it is looked upon as explaining the reluctance of the Spaniards to give the Americans an answer in regard to the Caroline Islands, as well as the questions of religious liberty there, and the latest developement s confirm the report that the Spaniards have been instructed not to yield on these points until they have made a good bargain. The positions of the commissioners, says an American commissioner, is that of two card players, each studying his own hand and waiting for the opponent's lead.

May be Signed Next Week.

In spite of this temporary halt in nerotiations and contrary to general expectation, Judge Day, president of the American commission, believes the treaty will be signed next week. But a great deal of work must be done before the treaty is ready for signatures, as after ten weeks of negotiations the only articles accepted by both com-missions are the three leading ones providing for the cession of the Spanish colonies, and these only in principle and not in language.

The adjournment to day was at Judge Day's request, as the long morning session developed a divergence of opinion. Had the joint session been held the Americans would not have entered it as an united body. The exact nature of the differences of opin-Spanish evacuation commission, who ion cannot be ascertained, but it is introduced them. VERDICT NOT GUILTY.

Trial of Abe Dudley for the Murder of Henry Wilkins at Washington, N. C.

[Special Star Telegram.] WASHINGTON, N. C., Dec. 3.—The case of the State vs. Abe Dudley, for the murder of Henry Wilkins, came to an end at one o'clock this afternoon by the jury returning a verdict of not guilty. From the evidence presented to the jury we cannot see how they could have done otherwise. We believe the verdict meets the approval of the public. Although the parties who were engaged in the affray were surrounded by a number of witnesses not one could testify that Dudley fired the fatal shot or that he had a pistol in his possession at the time, having previously taken charge of day.
