those passed were the following: To amend the charter of Winston: to allow citizens of Rutherford to levy a special tax; to amend Chapter 134, Laws of 1891, relating to the lease of turpentine orchards; to authorize commissioners of Forsyth county to levy a special tax; to amend Chapter 34 of the Code and Chapter 181, Laws of 1889, relating to physicians-the act of 1889 allowed every doctor practic. ing medicine prior to that time to get license whether he had a diploma from college or not, and the time for application for and granting of such license is extended up to 1892. The bill passed to-day requires that an applicant for license must have a diploma from a medical college and such clerical acquirements as the State Board of Physicians may deem necessary.


