WILMINGTON TARIFF ASSOCIATION'S SUIT

WILMINGTON, N. C., SUNDAY, JULY 9, 1899.

Argument Before Inter-State Commerce Commission is Washington To-morrow-Evidence Taken in April.

To-morrow, July 10th, is the day set by the Interstate Commerce Commission for the hearing of the argument of counsel in the case of the complaint of the Wilminnton Tariff Association against various railroads, praying a reduction in freight rates from points west and east, the evidence for the complainant association having been taken, as STAR readers will remember. during a session of the Interstate Commerce Commission held in this city last April.

The argument will be made before the Commission sitting at Washington, and Judge W. A. Day, counsel for the Tariff Association, and Judge Baxter, leading counsel for the defendant railroads, will argue the case. It is confidently expected that a decision in the case will be announced by the Commission within the next few weeks.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Plans Arranged for Putting Into Effect the New Scavenger Ordinance.

The principal business which engaged the special meeting of the Board of Health yesterday morning was the adoption of plans to make operative the special ordinance passed at the last regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen with reference to the scavenger

work of the city. The new ordinance provides for the division of the area of the city into eight districts and the Health Department is empowered to advertise for bids for doing the scavenger work of each of these districts. The ordinance also stipulates that the successful bidders shall execute bonds in the sum \$50 each for the faithful performance of their duties. License will be granted to each scavenger who re-

ceives an appointment. It was also ordered at the meeting yesterday afternoon that the owner of the vacant lot on Second street near its intersection with Dock, be required to construct an abutment under the direction of the City Engineer which will prevent sand from washing into and filling the culvert below the said lot. This is the drain which runs under the storerooms of Messrs. Adrian & Co., corner of Front and Dock streets, and the sand from the vacant lot referred to is said to be responsible for the overflow of the store during a heavy rain several
