FAST RUN FROM FLORENCE.

One Hundred and Seventy-three Miles in Three Hours and Four Minutes.

The Florence correspondent of the Charleston News and Courier, writing under date of July 22nd, tells of a phenomenal run made by Engineer Frank McGowan on the short cut division of the Atlantic Coast Line between Florence and South Rocky Mount, N. C. The correspondent

"The run was made a few nights ago on train known as the northoound West Indian limited, and was from Florence to South Rocky Mount, a distance of 173 miles. The actual time consumed, running from Florence to South Rocky Mount, including twelve stops and six slow-downs, was less the six slow-downs, which really cut off one minute to each slow-down which reduced the actual time to 173 miles in 184 minutes.




