Chemical Company against J. P. Kir ven has engaged the attention of the Superior Court since Tuesday afternoon. It involves the title to 100 bales of cotton approximating in value \$2,-400 and shipped to Messrs. Alexander Sprunt & Son in the Fall of 1898. The defendant J. P. Kirven was indebted by lien to the plaintiff in the sum of about \$2,200 and the plaintiff claimed that the cotton shipped to Messrs. Sprunt & Son was the property of Kirven, the defendant, who, on the other hand, claimed that the cotton was the property of his brother, E. E. Kirven. The latter, claiming the cottoo, demanded payment for the same and the Virginia-Carolina Chemical Company entered suit and attached the money in the hands of Messrs. Sprunt & Son. It is to settle this controversy that the court is now en-


