A strong bulkhead is now being built and when densted, but in 1900 there were completed, the place will be filled in dence in Washington just as soon as will be completed. When a double row of piles in the river is completed, a line of anchor piles will be driven down about eight or ten feet nearer shore and at the base of the river bank. From the anchor piles will extend long iron rods which will be joined on to a strong belt that will extend around the outer row of piles, making the bulkhead perfectly secure.
