He said he would agree to discontinue the dance hall, at which there was serious complaint, and also to conduct the saloon in an orderly manner in every respect.

Mr. Cooper, as presiding officer, cast off the tie by voting against restoring the license but explained that if it had been only for 10 days, or something like that, to give Mr. Stern time to wind up his business, he would have voted in the affirmative.
