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

TOBACCO WAREHOUSE COMPANY.

Meeting Next Thursday for Organization. Committee in Session Yesterday.

The Chamber of Commerce Committee on the establishment of a tobacco market in Wilmington next season held a special meeting at 3:30 o'clock vesterday afternoon and went over the situation in its present advanced stage. Those present at the meeting were Messre. Geo. R. French, S. P. Mc-Nair, Geo. O. Gaylord, B. F. Hall, L. B. Rogers, W. B. Cooper and M. W. Jacobi.

As stated in these columns already, application has been made to the Secretary of State for a charter for the new company and the same is expected this week. A general meeting of the stockholders of the new company will be called for Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock for the purpose of organizing by the election of officers, directors, etc. A full attendance of stockholders is earnestly desired.


