Newly Elected Executive Board Held First Meeting of Fiscal Year Yesterday.

The first meeting of the newly elected Executive Board of the Chamber of Commerce was held yesterday at noon. President J. BOILER EXPLOSION.

One Dead and Several Injured as the Result of a Terrible Accident Down the River

ON A GOVERNMENT TUG.

Engineer J. Augustus Dickey Scalded to Death—Two Firemen and a Cook Also Badly Burned—Patients in Marine Hospital Here.

One dead and three others more or less injured—one perhaps fatally—is the result of a fearful boiler explosion on the government tug *Cynthia*, ten miles below the city, nearly opposite Carolina Beach pier, yesterday afternoon at twenty minutes before 2 o'clock. The *Cynthia* at the time of the accident was engaged in towing mud sows from the government dredge *Ajax*, which has been at work some time on the upper reach of Lilliput shoals, in the Cape Fear river, about the location given above. The tug was returning to the dredge for another sow and when about one thousand yards away the boiler blew open through the crown sheet without a moment's notice. Engineer Dickey was in the engine room, separated from the boiler by a partition, but he was literally burned alive by the steam. The colored fireman, Jackson, was below deck aft and was next worst injured. He is scalded all over the body and will probably die, according to reports last night from the Marine Hospital, to which he was sent upon being brought to the city. The other fireman, John Warren, white, was seated on the rail, opposite the boiler room, when the explosion came and he, too, is badly scalded about the face and chest, but is in no danger. He is also at the Marine Hospital, where he was reported as doing very well last night.

Cook Lovinier was passing the boiler room dock, opposite Human Warren, when the accident occurred and both the men were blown overboard. Mr. Lovinier is at his home on South Front street, and is being attended by Dr. Wright Hall. He is badly scalded on the face, neck, hands and arms and from the knees down. A reporter of the STAR visited the injured man at his home yesterday afternoon and received a graphic account of the accident. Mr. Lovinier said the men had not the least intimation that anything was wrong, when they heard a great bursting of steam. He was in the water before he recognized what had happened and clung to a hatch that had also been blown overboard. Fireman Warren swam back to the tug and was pulled aboard by Capt. Jesse D. Price, who was in command and escaped uninjured by being in the pilot house. Three other members of the crew, Mate Jno. W. Foreman, and Deck Hands Chas. 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IN THE FEDERAL COURT.

THE MAYOR'S COMMITTEES.

After an executive session in the Mayor's office lasting three hours last night, the newly elected Board of Aldermen came into its place of regular meeting in the city court room and elected a city engineer and a superintendent of streets, vice Capt. Walter G. MacRae, who declined the office, and also elected all complement of firemen and policemen for those respective departments.

Mr. S. P. Adams was chosen City Engineer and Mr. J. M. Woodard, the present very efficient incumbent, was re-elected Superintendent of Streets. Those offices were combined and tendered to Capt. MacRae at the first meeting of the new Board, but he declined in a courteous note read at the meeting last night. Capt. MacRae stated that he had previous engagements which he could not cancel, one of them, it is understood, being a contemplated trip abroad this Summer. He thanked the Board for the honor conferred upon him and wished great success to the new administration.

The Board made only three changes in the personnel of the present police force and only one in the fire department. While the meeting early in the evening was no more than an informal conference at which there was no chairman or secretary, the Board agreed harmoniously on the selections and also gave the Mayor their heartfelt approval of the committees appointed by him.

The Board came in regular session a few minutes before 10 o'clock, Mayor Springer in the chair, and all members present, except W. P. Gafford, Esq., who is in Brunswick county on legal business. Mr. Hasbagen read the nominations and the nominees as a whole were unanimously elected except vice.

In the police department Substitute A. D. Smith succeeds Policeman D. W. Willis; W. F. Craig succeeds S. J. Bryant; Fireman R. E. Hardee succeeds E. G. Jones and W. H. Howe was elected to fill a vacancy in the regular complement of 30 policemen. The change in the fire department is the election of Mr. Hardee to the position of vice.
