CARNIVAL PROJECT.

Joint Committee from the Jr. O. U. A. M. Will Decide the Matter To-night.

BEING CONSIDERED.

Jeff Davis Council in Session Last Night Delegated Pull Authority to its Representatives on Joint Board. Two Propositions Received.

IMPROVEMENTS AT CASWELL.

Several New Buildings Will be Erected. Extension to the Battery.

[Southport Standard, 17th.] With the work that is now going on, and the amount that it is to be started in the near future at Fort Caswell the prospects are that things will be quite ively there from now on until it is all completed some time next year. Contractor A. J. Robbins is at present at work with a force of carpenters and laborers constructing an administration building and a three quarter of a mile, macadamized road.
