NEW HEATING PLANT.

Public Building Committee Invites Bids on the System for the City Hall.

MAY INCLUDE THE ACADEMY.

Plans and Specifications New on Exhibition and Proposals Will be Received Until Oct. 21st-Philadelphia Engineer Submits the Idea.

In another column Chairman Z E. Murrell, of the Public Building Committee, officially calls for bids for the installation of a steam heating plant for the City Hall building according to plans and specifications which may be seen at the office of the City Clerk and Treasurer. The plane, etc., were prepared in Philadelphia and call for an up-to-date system in every particular. They are so drawn that bids may be made on the installation of a system for only the City Hall proper or proposals - may be submitted for installing a plant which will also include the Opera House, or Academy of Music.

The committee is very hopeful that the appropriation available for the purpose will be sufficient to allow the installation of a plant which will extend over the entire building and the publie is none the less anxious for that same end. The present heating facilities for the City Hall building in its entirety are far from adequate and are very expensive in the way of fuel, repairs, etc. With the system the committee has in view all offices and apartments in the big building may be kept at an even, comfortable temperature in the coldest weather and the cost of keeping the furnaces going will be reduced to a minimum.

If the improvement is made to extend to the Academy wing of the building it will inure greatly to the comfort of theatre patrons and will very materially add to the leasing value of

The Board of Audit and Finance, which must pass upon every appropriation and the awarding of contracts, has already consented to an appropriation for the City Hall itself, but very properly instructed the committee to ascertain what the cost of extending the system to the Acad. emy wing of the building would be. When the separate proposals are all in, the Board will then decide what it will do in the matter of extension.

Bids for the work will be received until Oct. 21st and, if the contract is awarded, work on the new system will will begin at once and be finished within 15 or 20 days.
