MRS. L. O. B. BRANCH DEAD.

Widow of Famous Confederate General Passed Away in Raleigh Last Night. [Special Star Telegram.]

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 9.-Mrs. L. O'B. Branch, widow of the famous Confederate general, killed at the battle of Sharpsburg, September 17, 1862, died at her home here to-night at 7:30 o'clock.
