The "Gresham" arrived for coal and will probably proceed south to Charleston this afternoon or to

Capt. Thomas D. Walker, pleasantly remembered here as an officer of the old "Colfax," thirteen years ago, is in command of the "Gresham" and many of his old Wilmington friends called last night to pay him their respecia. His ship is of a similar type to the "Algonquin," on this station a year ago. She is a steel vessel and, like the "Algonquin," was originally built for the Lakes but was cut in two and brought to the coast through the Wellon Canal. She was commissioned in 1897, is 205 feet over all, 724 tons and carries five guns. The "Algonquin" was built at Cleveland a year later, has a slightly larger tonnage but carries only four guns. The "Gresham" has four ward officers and eight or nine commissioned officers and a crew of 60 seamen.

The staff of officers is Capt. Walker, in command; First Lieutenant George Addison; Chief Engineer W.F. Blake-Turner; Second Assistant Engineer C. 8. Root and Dr. Clarence Morris, sur-

He began his long inspection four weeks ago at Portland, Me., and has already visited Boston, New London, New York, Delaware Breakwater, Norfolk and intermediate points. From Wilmington he goes to Charleston, thence south and around the Gulf coast as far as Galveston. Captain Shoemaker is no stranger in Wilmington, he having been stationed here 82 years ago in the old 'Moccasin," and later in the "Seward." In speaking of that time, Captain Shoemaker said last night: Those were my palmiest days, as second lieutenant." Captain Shoemaker is now at the head of the entire department. The Revenue Cutter Service is an arm of the Treasury, and is under direct control of the Secretary of the Treasury through a chief detailed and known as "Chief of Division of Revenue Cutter Service," the rank held by Captain Shoe-

maker. Wilmington is glad of an opportunity of having Captain Shoemaker in her midst, and but for the fact that his visit was unexpected, no doubt the city and Chamber of Commerce would have made preparations for receiving him and bidding him an official welcome to the port.


