THE VICE CRUSADE. TWO FREIGHT TRAINS

Indictments Returned Against Ten Defendants in the Superior Court.

LAW AND ORDER LEAGUE.

Best Local Talent Employed to Prosecute the Cases - Continuences Until the January Term -- Ten Cases from Mayor's Court -- Witnesses.

Brief mention was made in yesterday's paper of the arrest by the police of half a dosen individuals growing out of a revival of the effort on the part of the Law and Order League, organised in Wilmington some two years ago, to rid certain localities of the city of alleged resorts of vice. The magnitude of the effort became apperent in the Superior Court just before adjournment yesterday afternoon when the grand jury returned a batch of 30 indictments against ten keepers of houses of til repute in the vicinity of Fourth and Castle and on MacRae street. These were in addition to those ten other cass sent over by the Mayor

Hon. Jno. D. Bellamy and Thos. W. Davis, Esq., have been retained to prosecute the cases and Mr. Bellamy stated in court yesterday afternoon when a continuance of the cases was suggested, that while he had no desire to oppress any one he would ask that caplases issue for the defendants and that they be brought into court and be required to give good and sufficient bonds for their appearance at the January term. He frankly said that he had been employed by the Law and Order League and that its purpose was to break up dens of vice in the central portions of the city; that while it was perhaps impossible to suppress them entirely they could be relegated to sections of the city where they would be less objectionable.

The bills of indictment charge "keeping a disorderly house" in sevlicense" and "seiling liquor on Sunday." A dozen witnesses appear on several of the papers, including prominent members of the Law and Order League and private parties who have been employed to quietly visit places ia question and secure evidence Messrs. Herbert McClammy, Marsden Bellamy and other leading attorneys of the Wilmington bar, have been engaged to appear for defendants, and a plea was made yesterday that several of the number have now over \$600 deposited in the aggregate as bonds from the Mayor's court and it would be oppressive to require them to give more. An understanding was reached by which it is understood that those who have already deposited large bonds will not be required to put up more money, but will execute the

THE END OF COURT.

IN HEAD-ON COLLISION.

Smash-Up of Coast Line and Seaboard Engines Near Hilton Bridge Yesterday-No Serious lojary.

A head-on collision between an Atantic Coast Line freight train arriving from the south and a Seaboard Air Line freight leaving the city over the same track occurred yesterday morning at 7:45 o'clock just this side of Hilton bridge to the north of the city. The Seaboard engine and two fist cars in the train were completely demolished, the Coast Line engine was partially wrecked and the conductors on both trains were thrown to the floor of their cabooses and more or less bruised and cut about their heads. The engine crews escaped by jumping. Both railroad companies use the

same tracks over the bridge and across

the marshes to Navassa, four miles

from the city. The Coast Line train

had the right of way yesterday morn-

ing and had just crossed the bridge, running at a comparatively low rate of speed. The Seaboard train had just left the S. A. L. yards in this city and was going out of the yard limits, in an opposite direction and also at rather low rate of speed. Either because the Seaboard engineer failed to wait at the post for signals or because the brakes when applied failed to hold the wheels on the frosty rails, the Seaboard train rush d around the rather sharp curve at that point and the two engines came together with a crash. One of the flat cars was doubled back in almost a perfect fold; another was torn up and several others were more or less broken up. The Seaboard engine, the samaller of the two, mounted the big Coast Line engine and was torn completely to pieces. But for the fact that the engineer and firemen of each reversed their engines and jumped, they would almost certainly have been killed.
