CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 9. - The Turkish official report of the incident at Alexandretta complained of by the United States consul, W. R. Davis, has been telegraphed by the Governor of Beirut, Syria, as follows:

"Atta Rian, a native of Kharput, who has for some years been abroad, recently entered the country secretly and had been travelling in the interior with a Turkish passport.

MORGAN'S SPEECH IN THE SENATE.

Opposed Cuban Bill But Devoted Most of His Attention to the Panama Canal.

CRITICISED THE PRESIDENT

Declared the United States Was Practi cally at War With Colombia-The President Had Fallen Into Trap. A Herrible Transaction.

By Telegraph to the Morning Star.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.-Senator Teller concluded his speech in opposition to the Cuban reciprocity bill to-day, and Senator Morgan was heard in opposition to that measure. The Alabama senator devoted the greater share of his attention to the Panama canal situation.

Mr. Teller took up the question of the activity of General Wood, while acting as Governor of Cubs, in behalf of Cuban reciprocity with the United States. He said there were official records to show that the Cuban government had paid to exceed \$15,000 in that interest during General Wood's administration. He declared that the press of both the United States and Cuba had been utilized in support of the policy of reciprocity, and quoted figures showing the amounts paid for newspapers advocating this policy.

Mr. Morgan took occasion in the course of his remarks to refer frequently to the Panama canal treaty and in that connection he again freely criticised what he denominated 'Presidential usurpation." He declared that the United States is becoming affected to the core with covetousness, and said the country seemed to quivering with doubt as to whether it should go over entirely or pursue the better course followed by our national fathers. So far as he was concerned he would not be so mean as to yield to a temptation to simply advance the commercial interests of his State. He spoke of the 20 per cent. reduction guaranteed by the bill to Cuban products, but warned the people that it might turn out to be a Spooner bill, which this government may evade or not as it sees. Indeed, he as-

serted, that the United States would do as it might please with the island of Cuba which he declared is little more than a dependency. "She is," he said, "Now fettered to the docks of our warships as firmly as Prof. Langley's airship was ever attached to his houseboats. He spoke of the negotiation of the

Panama canal treaty as a grotesque action and said that Panama had no more right to appoint a minister to the United States than that country had to consecrate a saint. Mr. Morgan said that Cuba would

do well to give careful heed to our purposes in the legislation under consideration. They should not follow the old adage not to look a gift horse in the mouth, for in this case "the gift horse is a broncho which greets them with a whinney and may send them away with a kick." Returning to the Panama situation,

Mr. Morgan said that the United States is practically at war with Coombia as the result of the fact that the President had fallen into a trap. He wanted, he said, to save the Senate from this same trap, and again referred to Buneau-Varilie, the Panama minister, and after reviewing briefly that gentleman's history as an engineer and contractor on the Panama canal, he said that he had "contracted wisely and well and had left the isthmus a rich man."

Mr. Morgan declared that he had no purpose of creating a sensation, but that his whole purpose was to warn the Senate against ratifying a treaty, the negotiation of which he characterized as "A most wretched, a most abominable and a most borrible transaction." Notwithstanding this was the case, the senator continued, "The Senate sleeps over this breach of the Monroe doctrine, while the President of France and the President of the Juited States stand over the recumbent figure and intone in unison their solemn and satisfied amen.

He expressed the opinion that the cost of the Panama canal in its early stages would be so great as to cause Congress to stop the appropriation before the enterprise had gone far and thus accomplish the purpose of the transcontinental railways in preventing the construction of any canal. Discussing the President's message,

he said the chief executive had failed to execute the Spooner law because it was distasteful to him and that he had not succeeded in formulating any satisfactory excuse for his course. He predicted that the time would come when Cuba would "clip the threads that restrain her and bind her to us, and again float off into the sea of lib-In such an effort, he continued. Cuba might find a friend in Germany, which might follow our example and create a state of independence in a night and then annex it with the coming sunrise. No doubt there would be fighting, for who, he said, is more eager to fight than Emperor William III or our own "strenuous"

He then proceeded to say that only yesterday he had met a great Democrat who "had a place in our affairs only second in importance to the presidency and had made a name for himself in diplomacy (evidently meaning former Secretary of State Olney) who had bowed his head as he said: For the first time in my life I have to confess that I am ashamed of the attitude of my country.'

Mr. Morgan, reverting again to Cubs, said: "Our relations with that island ought to remain as they are, so far as our economic policy is concerned, or she ought to be admitted as a State. Mr. Morgan closed by reading an

article from the Financial News, of London, of which he said: "If that is true, or if it is a presentation in advance of the consequences that are to follow, we have got to fight Great Britain on account of this treaty or else we have got to be disgraced." The Senate adjourned until to-mor-

UPBUILDING THE NAVY

Congress Urged Not to Relax Efforts for Increased Naval Construction.

By Telegraph to the Morning Star. Washington, Dec. 9.—Chairman Foss, of the House Committee on Naval Affairs, had a conference with the President to-day regarding the attitude of Congress during the present session toward increased naval construction. The subject is being given careful consideration by the President and by Congress. The President has urged Congress not to relax its efforts in the upbuilding of the navy, and has said that provision should be made for a general staff of the navy similar to that provided for


