Newborn Journal: Measles may be said to be epidemic in this city. There are 147 absentees in the white graded school caused by this disease.

The Democrats of Greenboro at a municipal convention on Friday night nominated T. J. Murphy for mayor. A motion was adopted to authorize the executive committee to formulate plans for a legalized primary.

Charlotte Peoples' Paper: We see some men smelling round going to get, waiting for the election to get a job under the new administration, that would not be allowed to drive a muley bull to a scavenger cart in the jungles of Africa.

The Singleton Silk Company, of Dover, New Jersey, and Wadeboro, N. C., has purchased a mill in Augusta, Georgia and will reorganize it as the Insecta Silk Company to make warps in silk. The mill which has been purchased is one up the canal not far from the Sibley.

Newborn Journal: The electric railway proposition which has been agitated in Elizabeth City for some time has failed by reason of its re-puted supporters declining to make good the cause. A misunderstanding between the city council and the promoters is stated to be the reason for the failure.

Application was made Wednesday morning to the Secretary of State for the chartering of a new mill and a half dollar mining corporation at Curlew, but the papers had to go back for correction in that they had failed to comply with the law in specifying interests, and some other particulars concerning the issuance of preferred stock.

At Fayetteville Friday morning the funeral services took place at St. James' Episcopal church over the remains of Mr. J. A. Worth, who died at Harrisburg, Pa., of typhoid pneumonia. Mr. Worth was for many years a trusted employe in the rail- way service, first with the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railway, and after- ward with the Atlantic Coast Line, and was a young man of fine character.

The commencement of the North Carolina Medical College will take place in Charlotte May 14th and 15th. The principal exercises will take place in the Academy of Music on the evening of the 15th, beginning at 8 o'clock and will consist of the graduating exercises of the medical class in the college and the class of nurses in the Presbyterian Hospital. Hon. Cameron Morrison, of the Charlotte bar, will deliver the principal address, and Dr. W. Gill Wylie, of New York, will speak to the graduates and other persons present in the capacity of a profes- sionist.

The distillery of the North Caro- lina Distillery Co. of Hamlet, has been seized by revenue officers under in- structions from Washington. This is one of the biggest distilleries in the State and its manager Starkey Hard, was for a number of years a deputy revenue collector. The seizure is for irregularities, the government claim- ing, it is said, that there should be an assessment of \$100,000 on the com- pany to cover a discrepancy in the whiskey reported by the company for taxation and the amount the distillery should have made from the meat de- livered as freight to the company by the railroads.

Charlotte Chronicle: Of all the larger towns in North Carolina, Char- lotte and Salisbury appear to be alone in the fact that they will have quiet municipal elections next week. It is true that there was a pretty warm fight in Salisbury prior to the Demo- cratic primaries, but after the re-nomination of Mayor Boyden, the excitement cooled down, and the ticket named will be elected without opposition. In Greensboro, Durham, Raleigh, Goldsboro and other towns, the fight are on, citizens' tickets having been named in opposition to the Democrats in some instances. In each of these towns the liquor question is a burning issue.

A dispatch from Durham on Friday says: Mr. B. L. Duke, who has been absent from Durham since last fall, when he went to New York, a short while afterwards was married to Mrs. Webb and then taken in charge on sanitary grounds, arrived in his home in this city. He is looking well and appears the same. Brodie Duke, so well known to all of our peo- ple. An effort was made to see him this afternoon but he was at his home and was not seen. It is learned that the suit has not been settled yet, but that the move towards a settlement will probably be successful in a few days. The details of this settlement have not been made public.

Governor R. B. Glenn delivered the address at the closing of the grad- ed school at Sanford Thursday night. He spoke from the very same rostrum on which he stood several years ago, when things political were a blood heat, and there addressed the voters on what were then the political issues of the day. Mr. Glenn's address was one most fitting to the occasion, many saying they had never heard an ad- dress so timely and so filled with good common sense, and withal delivered in so masterly a manner. In the course of his talk, which was clear and simple as well as filled with the more serious concerns of life, he urged the development of the phys- ical, mental, and the spiritual and moral nature, pleading with his hear- ers not to neglect that for which they were created above all things else.

Early Thursday morning three men were arrested in Summer town- ship, Guilford county, on the charge of firing the barn of Mr. Isaac H. Stan- ley of that township. The names of the men arrested are T. B. Farrington, Botie Farrington and Fred O'neal, all of whom are white and are known to have been among those who have engaged in retailing in that sec- tion. The hearing was continued un- til Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. The arrests were made by Sheriff Fur- dan, assisted by Assistant State Fire Inspector Neely. It is charged that the parties became incensed at Mr. Stanley for reporting them for retail- ing and blockading. All three of the

men were under bond at the time of the arrest for retailing. They are now in jail pending the hearing Saturday. The evidence against them is said to be very strong. They are charged with going to the house Sunday night, setting the large feed barn of Mr. Stanley's, worth several thousand dol- lars, and two other buildings, on fire. The family was awakened by an ex- plosion of dynamite, which was in the barn.

A dispatch from Kingston on Thursday says: The preliminary trial of the three Worleys, P. B. Worley and his sons, Tom and Clem, for the killing of E. H. Worley, was conclud- ed this afternoon, and as a result P. B. Worley was liberated, while the two brothers, Tom and Clem, were held for the next term of court with- out bail. The autopsy yesterday, when the body was examined for examina- tion, revealed quite a different state of affairs from what had been found by the superficial examination of the coroner's jury. It was found that one knife wound had penetrated the as- cending artery, thus causing death; that two knife thrusts had severed the ligaments of the spinal column in the neck, thus giving preternatural mo- tion to the head and the supposition of the coroner and jury that the neck was broken. The heart was a section of the neck bones were brought to Kingston and placed in evidence, thus removing all doubt in the matter. The case was ably contested by emi- nent counsel on both sides. Ex-Gov- ernor Aycock appeared for the defence and Senator D. L. Ward for the prosecution. Argument by these two gen- tlemen were among the strongest ever heard here. Habeas corpus proceed- ings will be begun here to-morrow be- fore Judge W. R. Allen for the liberation of the two prisoners. Self-defence is the plea made by counsel.
