SPIRITS TURPENTINE.

A negro boy met his death Friday afternoon at High Point while riding on the steps of a shifting engine near the Tate Furniture Factory. He fell among the wheels of the engine, which with two cars passed over his body. The State Board of Medical Examiners began their examinations at Greensboro Thursday morning. There are 120 applicants for license, thirteen of the number being colored. The board will be in session until Tuesday, when the State Medical Society will meet.

Raleigh Post, May 20: The Governor of New Jersey, while enroute from Goldsboro to Newbern, looking from the car windows of the Atlantic and North Carolina railway train, remarked that the one thing that surprised him most in North Carolina was the apparent fertility and productiveness of the soil.

At a late hour Thursday night Miss Nora Lassiter attempted suicide in West Durham by throwing herself into the reservoir connected with the Erwin Cotton Mills. She was seen in time to be prevented from taking her life. The would-be suicide is a young woman employed in West Durham. The causes that led her to attempt the rash act are not known.

The grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias of North Carolina will meet in Charlotte, June 13 and continue in session till Wednesday. The guest of honor will be Supreme Chancellor Charles E. Shiveley of Richmond, Ind. A reception will be tendered Mr. Shiveley at the Manufacturers Club. Mr. E. Randolph Preston, of the Charlotte bar, will deliver the address of welcome.

Raleigh Post: It became necessary yesterday to amputate the foot of Mr. Hubert King, brakeman on the Seaboard Air Line, who was injured by slipping from the steps of a box car. The operation was performed in Rex Hospital, where King was brought for treatment. Attendees at the hospital last night said that the patient was doing well, and his recovery is only a question of a short time.

Raleigh Post, May 20: The many friends of Mr. R. H. Bradley, marshal and librarian to the North Carolina Supreme Court, will be glad to learn that his injuries received in a recent fall on the Wilmington street pavement are healing nicely. He was walking down Wilmington street when his foot became entangled in a small wire that was lying on the pavement and tripped him so that he fell violently forward, his face striking the pavement first, so that an ugly cut was inflicted just over the left eye, also a painful bruise nearer the center of the forehead.

Raleigh News and Observer: Messrs. John A. Park, Eugene McDonald, Val Perkins, Max Gardner, and S. O. Perkins, the latter from A. & M. College, have planned to visit Europe this summer, and will make the trip to Liverpool aboard a cattle ship, working their passage. They will leave Newport News June 1st, accompanied by students from the State University and Wake Forest College. From Liverpool they will go to London, and thence to Paris, Switzerland, Belgium, Portugal and Norway up as far as the Alps, and then back to Raleigh, via New York city.

A dispatch from Charlotte on Friday says: G. B. Carter, business manager of the Charlotte Observer, will leave for Raleigh in a few days, his position being transferred to that city, where he becomes editor and manager of the Raleigh Evening Times. It is not known whether Mr. Carter will move his family to Raleigh in accordance with the ownership of the paper is said to be still in the hands of Mr. John C. Drewry, and it is not yet known whether Mr. D. A. Tompkins has purchased a controlling interest in the paper as has been reported. Mr. Carter is well known among newspaper men as one of the ablest business managers in this section.

A dispatch from Durham on Friday says: Three students of Trinity College were expelled to-day on account of a disturbance at the college. Nearly eighty students engaged in a lively lark on the campus, dressed in various gaudy and patterned costumes, and singing songs, raising yells, and using obscene language. The faculty called the boys before them, and expelled the three leaders, and decided to give the others a severe lecture. The expelled are: L. B. Pope, of Dunn; P. Fulemhlmer and H. Hasty, of Monroe. Fulemhlmer was Trinity's pitcher, and was one of the best athletes ever at the college. There was a similar demonstration last year, and the students, after being severely reprimanded, were then warned against a recurrence.

At Raleigh on Friday the secretary of State issued a charter to a million dollar corporation to be known as the Southern Tin Company, of Gastonia. All the authorized capital stock has been subscribed. The incorporators are: T. M. Faysoux, L. F. Graves, D. M. Jones, J. F. Holland and A. G. Mangum, all of Gastonia. The objects for which the concern was formed are to conduct the business of mining, milling, concentrating and dealing in tin, gold, silver, copper, lead, zinc, iron, steel and all kind of ores, metals and minerals, and in their by-products, to deal in real estate and to do a general construction business. The company is organized mainly to mine, smelt and deal in tin, owning very extensive mines in Gastonia county, N. C., and Cherokee county, S. C., in which is one of the most extensive deposits of tin ore in this country.
