REMAINS LAID TO REST.

Lewis, a brother of the deceased, the services having been conducted by Rev. J. A. McLaughlin, pastor of Brookline Baptist church. The remains were laid to rest in Bellevue cemetery.

INSPECTED NAVAL MILITA.

Colonel T. H. Bala, of Goldsboro, Inspector of the North Carolina National Guard, and Adjutant F. H. Shipps, of the North Carolina Naval Brigade, arrived yesterday and last night in their armory on Princess street, conducted the annual inspection of the Wilmington Division, Naval Reserves, in command of Lieut. H. M. Chase and Lieut. J. B. Peesuch. The division appeared for inspection with full ranks and there is every reason for stating that the Wilmington sailors passed a very creditable inspection. It was announced that the division will very soon be equipped with brand new Krag Jorgensen rifles and navy pistols. The equipment is expected in a very few days. Col. T. C. James, of the Second Regiment, and other local National Guard officers accompanied Col. Bala and Adjutant Shipps in making the inspection last night.

QUEER STERN-WHEEL CRAFT.

Mr. Jno. W. Squires, of Natmore, Bladen county, came down the river yesterday in a neat little craft which he has rigged up himself and which he proposes to run as a freight boat upon a small scale between Wilmington and the "home port." The boat is about 25 feet long and has a stern wheel propelled by a hand crank rigged up with a system of weights which propel the wheel quite rapidly and is productive of great speed. The new boat was built outright by Mr. Squires and on her trial trip yesterday was anchored in Princess street dock where she attracted a good deal of attention.

FOURTH OF JULY REGATTA.

Carolina Yacht Club Planning For Big Annual Event. The regular annual regatta of the Carolina Yacht Club will be sailed over the club course on July 4th and will progress one of the drawing cards at Wrightsville Beach on that great National holiday. The race will start on high water at 10 o'clock in the morning and indications are that there will be a sufficient number of entries to make the regatta one of unusual interest. There will be at least two new boats in the list of entries and their behavior will be watched with pleasure.

AS TO LIQUOR LICENSES.

McEachern of the county board, after which the licenses were issued without further hitch. A majority of the applications not in proper shape have been made so by the dealers and returned to the office. The applicants have until tomorrow at 1 o'clock when the office of the Register of Deeds closes, to get their applications and have them approved and licenses issued thereon.
