The deed had evidently been committed in front of the mirror of the dresser, as blood was found on the cover beneath. took up the religious condition of Japan, describing the Buddhist and "In this rapidly growing city there the Shintoist religions and showed that is great need of an adequate supply as the Japanese were becoming edube interesting to give even a suort synopsis of his description of Buddhism and Shintoism. -Buddha was a Philosopher, who lived about three thousand years ago in India. He saw for the better ordering of their lives. He taught that every product of the human mind was an illusion and that nothing was in reality permanent. He

showed how in many respects Budda's idea of ethics was identical with the Christian religion of to-day. But,

and he was brought up with the knowledge that he, too, must fill this hereditary office, and at the very early age of fourteen really did become an assistant to his Father. But, about this time Japan was shaking off the yoke of ignorance and was becoming alive to the importance of education. His companions were fitting themselves for future usefulness as statesmen, as diplomats or as soldiers and he soon saw the utter futility of his
