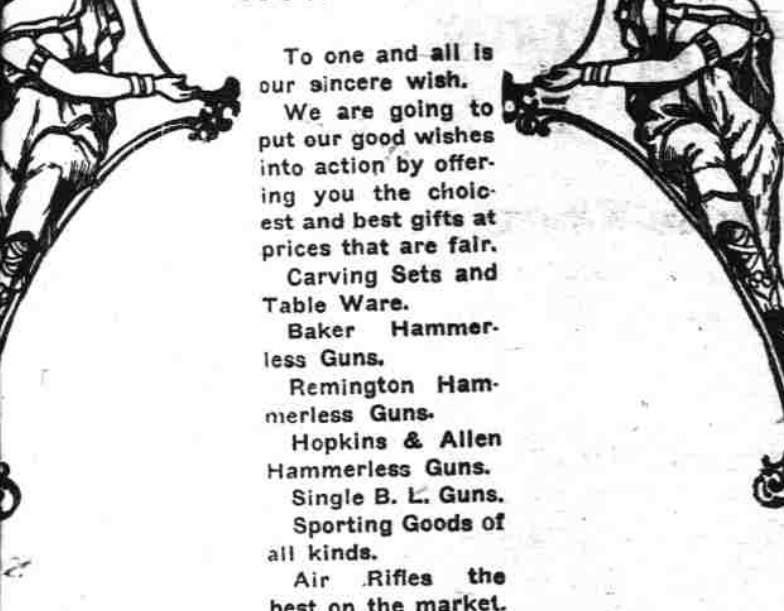

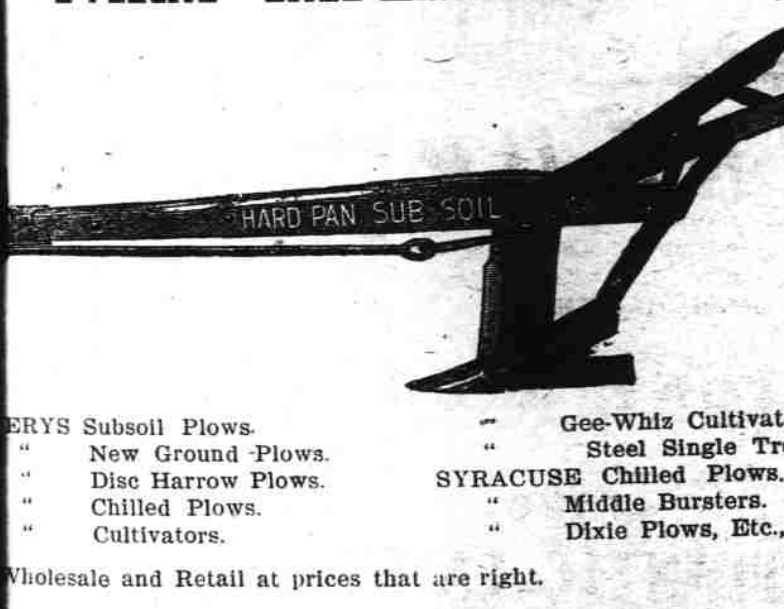

### SPIRITS TURPENTINE. MOROCCAN CONFERENCE.

At the term of the Superior Court at Durham this week three divorces were granted and two other divorce cases were non-suited, probably to be entered again.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the State Hospital for colored insane, at Goldsboro, on Wednesday, Dr. W. W. Faison, was elected without opposition to succeed the late Dr. J. E. Miller, superintendent of the asylum.

At Raleigh on Wednesday, The Wallace Manufacturing Company, of Wallace, amended its charter by increasing the capital stock from \$10,000 to \$25,000. The two principal officers of the company are Alex. Newton, president, and H. K. Walton, secretary.

Governor Glenn, accompanied by Miss Rebekah Glenn, returned to Raleigh Wednesday night from Washington. The Governor expresses satisfaction at the outlook for the passage of the Dick military bill, having seen many members while there. He is greatly pleased at the reputation given him in the National capital.

Dr. Thos. Featherstonhaugh, at Rutherfordton, last week gathered material for an article which he is writing for the Southern Historical Society, of Washington, on "The Baring-Cleveland's second administration. Dr. Featherstonhaugh was chief examining surgeon of the United States Pension Bureau, and is at present assistant surgeon in the same department.

Leo D. Heatt, of Raleigh, was on Wednesday appointed temporary treasurer of the North Carolina division of the Southern Cotton Association, as authorized by the executive committee. President Moore presided at the meeting. Bond was given by the treasurer and the monies already collected by the president and H. C. Dockery, chairman of the executive committee, were received.

A dispatch from Rutherfordton on Wednesday says: The engineering corps of the South & Western Railway Company, which has been stationed at Poore's Ford for over a month, has moved headquarters to a point near Mr. A. B. Jones, it is reliably reported, for the purpose of making a preliminary survey by Rutherfordton. The road may yet come to Rutherfordton, although it would be difficult to make the citizens of this place believe such good news.

Superior Court at Durham came to an abrupt end Wednesday afternoon when Judge Garland J. Ferguson adjourned court on account of the death of his aged mother, who passed away Tuesday night at her home near Waynesville. Mrs. Ferguson was in her 95th year of age, and had been in a serious condition for several weeks. She had partial paralysis of the throat and this, coupled with old age, caused death. Last week Judge Ferguson had to adjourn court in Greensboro because it was thought that his mother was dying.

The school book question is again about to be on the stir in State circles at Raleigh. A number of the officers of State and others are already making a study of text books. In view of the expiration of the present contract for books, July 1, 1906. The sub-commission will meet in June, after appointment by the Governor, and the text book commission will meet in July, the State Board of Education constituting this last named commission. This decision will be announced in time for the publishers chosen to have their books in readiness by the opening of the schools.

An unusually large congregation gathered in the Hay Street Methodist church, at Fayetteville, Sunday morning, attracted by the fact that a movement was to be begun for a new church building. The pastor, Rev. D. H. Tuttle, preached a special sermon to that end. During the meeting it was shown that the active membership of the congregation represented nearly \$500,000, with an annual income of about \$25,000. The congregation enthusiastically committed itself to a new building to cost \$25,000, from \$5,000 to \$6,000 being subscribed at once, since being increased to nearly \$7,000.

Judge J. C. Pritchard, of the United States Circuit Court, is engaged in writing a biography of the late Chief Justice Pearson, of the North Carolina Supreme Court, which will probably be completed about February 1st. There is being prepared, in book form, a publication under the editorship of William Draper Lewis, dean of the University of Pennsylvania, biographies of 60 noted American lawyers now dead, and in this edition will find place the biography of Chief Justice Pearson, as prepared by Judge Pritchard. Judge Pritchard was requested by the distinguished editor of these life-sketches of prominent American jurists to prepare the sketch of Judge Pearson. He had collected much material for the sketch, touching the life and works of the distinguished North Carolina jurist.

A case of genuine lockjaw developed in Fayetteville, and the patient has been completely cured by skilled treatment. Tom Davis, a colored boy about 12 years old hurt himself, apparently only slightly, by the explosion of a firecracker Christmas day. Two weeks passed, the wound giving increasing pain all the time, before Dr. H. Henderson, a well-known colored physician, was summoned, who seeing the case was serious, and that lockjaw had developed, called Dr. Mc Gowan into consultation. The latter recommended antitoxine and made an injection, which he repeated in 24 hours, made a third injection at the end of 36 hours in the spinal cord, which was followed by evident symptoms of relaxation. Malford's serum was then used. In 12 days the patient had almost wholly recovered.

Washington correspondence Charlotte Observer. The Republican State organization got an awful jar direct from the White House, to-day when the President transmitted to the Senate the name of Cyrus P. Frazier for postmaster at Greensboro and that of Louis N. Grant for postmaster at Goldsboro. Both these men are prominent Blackmen, and had placed their political fortunes wholly in the keeping of the gentlemen from the eighth. The organization people are antipathetic when they hear what the President had done, for the writer is in a position to state, without fear of contradiction, that Mr. Roosevelt, and not the Department, made these appointments. Not the least astonishing feature of this performance is the fact that Postmaster Dobson not only had an excellent record, and was well endorsed by patrons of his office, but he was endorsed by Chairman Robbins and National Committeeman Duncan, who came here a few days ago to look after the matter and went on to the station, rejoicing in the fancied belief that all was well. In fact, Chairman Robbins showed Mr. Grant a letter from the Department saying that Mr. Dobson's record was excellent and that he would be re-appointed unless some valid reason could be advanced why he should not be. Mr. Grant simply smiled and remarked that he "supposed things would come out all right in the wash," or words to that effect, and that Mr. Blackburn was looking after his interests.
