Harris, a farmer shot himself to death. Herris entered the bank and commanded W. A. Gillen, cashier and Theodore Sells, a clerk, to throw up their hands. He then ordered them to pull down the window blinds and lock 'the doors. Sells went behind a counter, ostensibly to pull down a window curtain and escaped through a back door. Fearing capture Harris calmly killed himself.






