TURPENTINE**

—Pender Chronicle:—On the 18th Mr. G. W. Horsey, showed us some nice young raddishes large enough for table use—the first of the season. Mr. Horsey is busy planting peas and preparing land for potatoes and other truck crops.

—Pender Chronicle:—On the morning of January 20th at 10 o'clock, many suitcases were gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. McLendon, about five miles west of Burgaw, to witness the nuptials of their fourth daughter, Miss Emma Shepard McLendon, and Mr. William E. Bennett Bloodworth, a prominent young man of Rocky Point.

—Elizabeth City, Jan. 23.—The barrel factory of Coinjoints was totally destroyed by fire early this morning. The origin of the fire is unknown. The factory was one of considerable capacity, manufacturing many thousand barrels during the trucking season. The factory will very probably be rebuilt at once.

—Captain R. C. G. Love, Gastonia's pioneer cotton mill man, and one of that town's leading and wealthiest citizens, died of heart failure on Wednesday at Brunswick, Ga., where he was visiting his daughter, Mrs. C. S. Tait. Capt. and Mrs. Love left Gastonia on Friday of last week to go to Brunswick. He was a large holder of cotton mill stocks.

—High Point, Jan. 23.—The 20 year old daughter of Nan Stevenson, white, committed suicide here this morning by drinking a bottle of carbolic acid at her home in the eastern part of the city. She and her mother had a quarrel an hour or so before and this is given as the girl's reason for the act. She was in the throes of death when she found and died before the doctors could render any relief.

—Burrus now can boast of one of the nicest bank buildings to be found in a country town. Located on the best corner in town and with the two front sides built of white pressed brick it makes a magnificent appearance. It has five nice office rooms on the second floor, with the bank proper, the drug store of Mr. J. R. Bannerman and Dr. Bradford's office on the ground floor. The bank furniture and equipment are up-to-date and as nice as in any like bank in a city and the ring of the tiled floor gives it indeed a metropolitan air. Our banking facilities are second to none in this section.

—Washington, Jan. 23.—Patrick Parvin, son of Capt. William Parvin, of the Norfolk & Southern steamer R. L. Myers, was drowned in Blount's Creek 10 miles from this city, this morning. He was working as engineer of the tug Barney, belonging to S. R. Powner & Son. The tug had gone down to the creek to tow some raft logs to the city. As the tug went up the creek Parvin came on deck and in some way fell overboard, falling under the steamboat. Being unable to swim he drowned before assistance could reach him. Parvin was a married man, 30 years old and very popular in the city.

—Yesterday afternoon at the office of Mr. George W. Wright an association known as "The Leebriates Relief Association" was organized. Rev. R. E. Neighbor was elected temporary president, Mr. W. F. Snyder was elected treasurer, and Mr. George W. Wright, secretary. It is the object of this association to aid men bound by drink to take treatment such as the "Three Day Treatment," "Keeley Cure," etc. There was present at the meeting a gentleman who had just returned from Reidsville. He said that the very taste for whiskey had been removed and that he was an entirely free man. The cost of treatment ranged from \$100 to \$150. Every citizen of Salisbury, man or woman, is invited to join this association. A person in becoming a member will be required to pay \$1 per month into the treasury. Sums above \$1 per month will be gratefully received. This movement is strictly humanitarian, and it is hoped that a great number of members will unite with the association. It is the desire of the association to send at least one person every month off for cure.

—Mount Olive Tribune:—The regular annual meeting of the stockholders of the Bank of Mount Olive was held in their banking house here Tuesday morning of last week. The following Board of Directors were elected for the ensuing year: J. B. Oliver, Y. H. Kacwee, R. Komegny, C. B. Hatch, Jas. M. McGee, E. N. Ricks, and W. Borden. At the meeting of the Board of Directors, held immediately after the stockholders meeting, the following officers were elected, except in the case of Mr. J. B. Oliver, as vice president, who succeeds the late Mr. R. J. Sotherland, Sr.: President, W. E. Borden; Vice President, J. B. Oliver; Cashier, M. T. Breaucourt; Assistant Cashier, Miss Corrie McGee. During the past year the bank has done a splendid business and has made a good profit. The usual three per cent semi-annual dividend having been declared and a good balance carried to the surplus account. The deposits for the year ending this month were \$11,000 more than for the year ending at a corresponding period last year, which is a true reflection of the general prosperity that prevailed among our people during 1906.

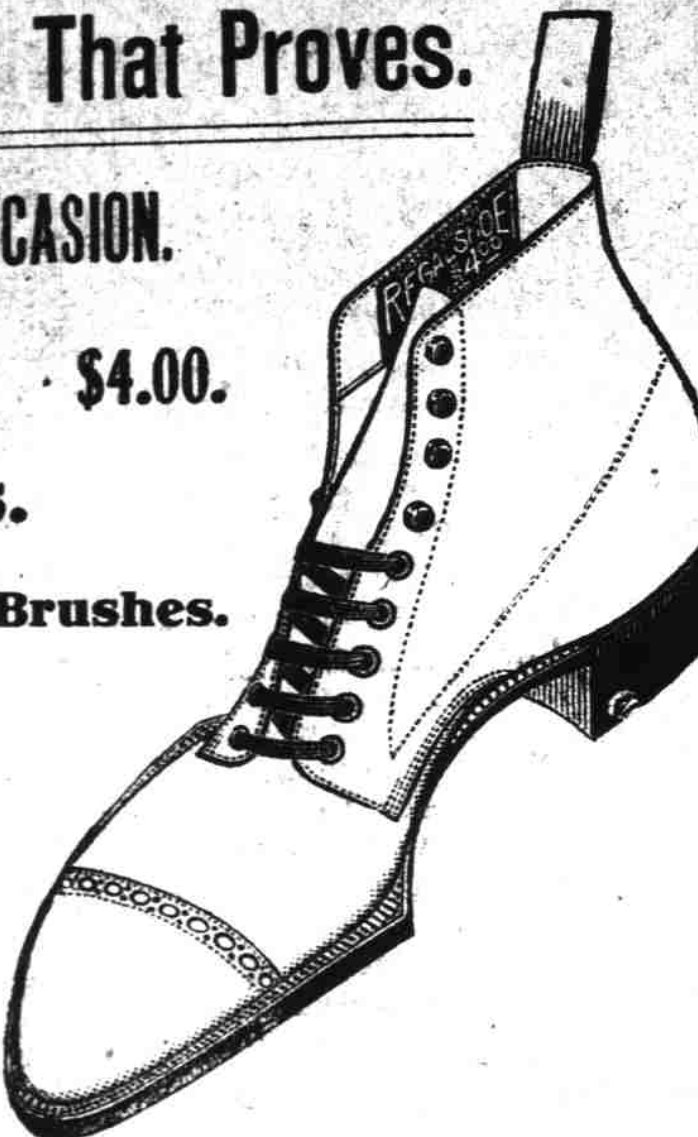
