GREAT PYRAMID OF GEZEH.

J. Adam Bohnet on Religious Phase of This World's Wonder. A rare treat is in store for Bible students in the lecture to be delivered by Mr. J. Adam Bohnet, V. D. M., of Pittsburg, Pa., under the auspices of the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society, of Allegheny, Pa., at the Academy of Music Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock, to which everybody is invited. Contrary to popular belief, the pyramid in Egypt called "Cheops" is not of Egyptian origin, was not built for a tomb and has never been used as such as will be argued. The exterior measurements and angles of this great building, the largest in the world, are said to be known to teach deep scientific truths, stating in no uncertain manner facts and figures which are strictly in accord with true science of to-day. The construction, arrangement and measurements of the interior galleries and chambers are said to be found a complete corroboration of the Bible story of man's fall and the plan of his redemption even to the minutest detail. The full salvation offered through Jewish laws, the impossibility of securing it by this means, the death and resurrection of Christ securing release from death for all men, the narrow way, the glorification of the church, the salvation of the world, are all shown clearly in symbols, while the measurements correspond to a year with the intricate prophecies of Scripture. Mr. Bohnet will use a chart of the interior arrangement and will make plain what he conceives to be the teachings of this stone witness. No admission will be charged. Arrangements are also made for Mr. Bohnet to give a Bible reading at the same place Sunday night and he will undertake to make the fifth chapter of the Song of Solomon plain. Both services are free.

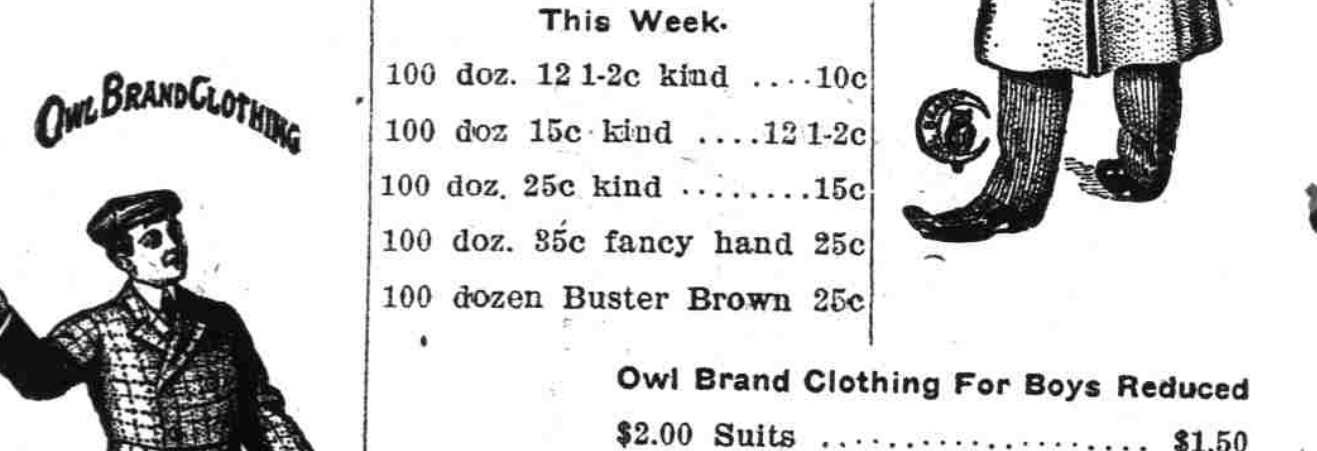
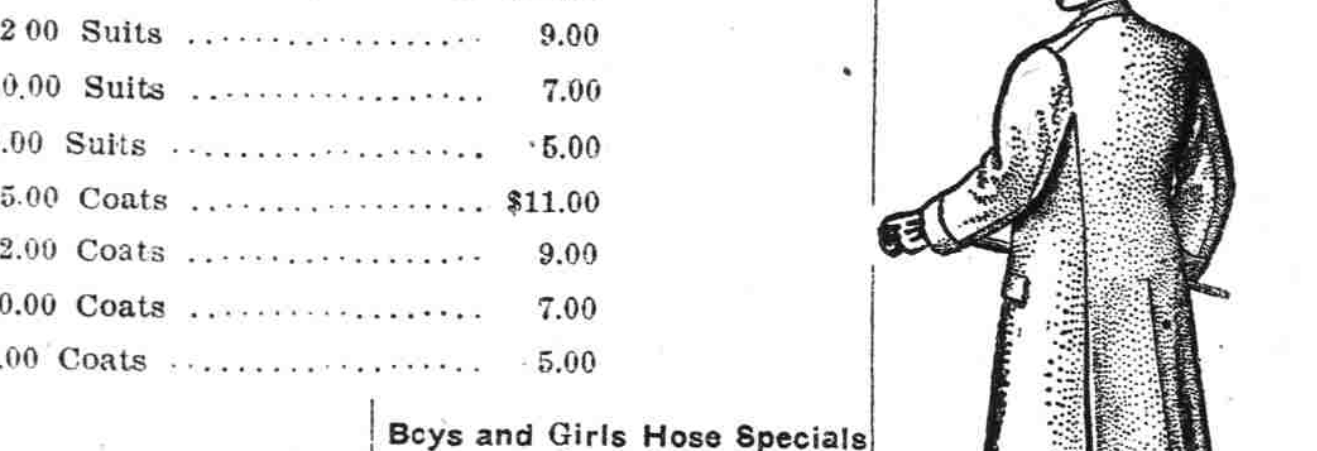
