RACE WAR AT LYNCHBURG.

Two Whites and Two Negroes Shot Last Night.

Lynchburg Va., April 3.—A race war occurred at 10 o'clock tonight at Fifth and Main streets in which two white men and two negroes were shot, one of the negroes' wounds being probably fatal. Three white men were walking on Fifth street and were crowded off the sidewalk by four negroes, one of the white men being knocked down. A quarrel followed, culminating in a general shooting af-
