

SPIRITS TURPENTINE

Mr. W. H. King, aged 40 years, a popular citizen of Raleigh and one of the best known druggists in the State, died in Raleigh on Tuesday morning as the result of a surgical operation and a complication of diseases.

Newbern, April 2: The damage by frost is slight here. Interviews with leading truckers say that they have not suffered by the frost at all. Others say crops were touched slightly.

Near La Grange on Sunday morning fire of unknown origin destroyed Mr. W. S. Uzzle's barn, stables, corn, fodder, farming implements and fine tons of fertilizer. There was some insurance.

Snow Hill, April 2: Track on the Snow Hill-Kinston Railway has been laid to the Greene county line, and the management expects to begin handling freight for the people along its line. The grading force is well over in Greene now.

Falson, April 2: Damage by the cold last night was inconsiderable as there was no frost. It is feared that crops will be hurt severely to-night as there is every indication of frost. Beans have been slightly damaged, but a big frost would kill the crop.

Fayetteville, April 2: It is practically assured that a big sash, door and blind factory is to be located in Fayetteville, with a capital of from \$75,000 to \$100,000. Mr. A. H. Slocumb has given the parties interested an option on a site, and he thinks that the factory will be located here.

The law partnership of Pou & Fuller, at Raleigh, has been dissolved by mutual consent. Mr. Thomas S. Fuller retires to become a member of the law firm of Nicoll, Anable & Lindsay, of New York. Mr. James H. Pou retains the law business at Raleigh.

Kinston, April 2: Master Paul Cheney, who was shot some weeks ago, underwent a skin graft operation at the hospital Saturday night. Two large ulcers which refused to heal were engrafted with new tissue taken from the lad's father's arm. Mr. Cheney permitting its removal without taking any anesthetic or anodyne. Master Paul is doing well.

Kinston, April 2: Effective today Mr. J. R. Hawkins, who has been superintendent of the P. O. & W. Railroad, becomes superintendent of the Beaufort division of the Norfolk & Southern as well, succeeding Mr. S. L. Dill, who becomes general agent. Superintendent Hawkins, in company with Mr. Dill, was in the city today getting a line on the affairs of the road.

Saulsbury suffered a disastrous fire Tuesday, the aggregate loss being about \$30,000 with partial insurance. The fire originated in the roof of the Barber Buggy Company from a spark from an engine on the premises. The factory and stock consumed was valued at \$8,000. The fire communicated to several business houses, the second largest losers being V. Wallace & Son's building valued at \$7,000.

Mt. Olive, April 2: Strawberries were damaged very little here by the severe cold weather last night, though the full extent of damage cannot be told until the thermometer rises and the warm sun comes out. The cold snap will doubtless greatly retard the shipping season. A strong wind prevailed all night and prevented heavy frost, which would have resulted very disastrously. The bean crop is not very far advanced, but all that were up are destroyed.

Kinston, April 2: Fire resulting from a careless negro tenant's act in burning off a little patch of weeds when a strong wind was blowing Friday afternoon, ruined 75 acres of ten-year-old forest growth and destroyed a half mile of fence for Mrs. Winnie Suggs at her place two miles from the city. The fire spread rapidly and increased in intensity until disaster threatened many in the section, but the alarm brought help quickly and the flames were stopped.

Elizabeth City, April 2: News was received this morning of the drowning of Mr. Robt. Cane, yesterday afternoon in Mill Tail Creek, a branch of Alligator River. Mr. Cane was in a gasoline yacht with Mr. Twiford and he accidentally fell from the moving yacht into the water and was drowned. His body never came to the surface and has not been recovered yet. Mr. Cane was about 30 years old and a young man highly esteemed in this section.

High Point, April 2: The High Point manufacturers expect to be well represented at the Jamestown Exposition, and to this end are already engaged in getting out samples to be placed on exhibition and literature giving desired information to those who are looking this way. In addition to this the Enterprise of this city is getting out a large number of sixty-page booklets of High Point and her manufacturing interests, which will be distributed gratuitously.
