Fayetteville Observer: Mr. N. H. Smith was notified last evening by the patent office at Washington that his application for a patent on an improved cotton harvester had been granted. Mr. Smith has made a practical demonstration with his harvester and says it works splendidly.

Charlotte News: Concord, Charlotte's lively little neighbor, is to have an electric street railway, with possibly connection with near-by places. Boston capitalists are back of the enterprise and it is known that they have large plans for the future. One of these is understood to be connection of Charlotte and Concord with an interurban line.

Henderson Gold Leaf: Posey, the 18-year-old son of Mr. Eugene Thorne, this morning at 10 o'clock ascended the ladder of the standpipe, 100 feet in height, with a rope around his neck. When discovered he was playing around its edge. Being coaxed by friends he descended without injury. It is said the cause of aberration of mind was the use of cigarettes.

News and Observer: Mr. M. L. Shipman, Commissioner of Labor and Printing, yesterday received a request for literature and reports concerning North Carolina from the American Jewish Society for the Regulation of Immigration, of New York. It is the desire of this Society to persuade Jewish immigrants to come South and to go to other less thickly populated sections of the country, leaving the congested cities.

Newbern Journal: It is stated that part of a skeleton of some large animal, possibly prehistoric, has been found in the marl beds on the Simmons-Bradham place, located a few miles from Newbern on the Trent river. In connection with the discovery of the skeleton of a large person found on the J. C. Brown farm a few miles further up the river leads one to think that perhaps there may be some interesting fossils hereabouts.

Southern Pines, April 27.—Charles George and Leon St. John, the oldest and most prominent hotel men in Southern Pines, were arrested here today charged with selling liquor and were brought before Magistrate John E. Buchan in the presence of members of the civic club and law and order society. They waived a hearing before the magistrate and gave bonds in the sums of \$600, \$600, \$400, for their appearance at the August term of Moore county court.

Greensboro, N. C., April 27.—United States District Court Clerk S. L. Trogdon today forwarded to the United States collectors, Wheeler Martin, of Raleigh, and Brown, of Statesville, nearly five thousand dollars as the net result of fines and forfeitures at the last term of the United States district court, held in Greensboro. Besides this, about four hundred dollars were sent to the government depository at Charlotte, as general collections during the term from other sources.

Greensboro, N. C., April 27.—United States Marshal Millikan left yesterday morning for Washington, having in charge a very bright boy named Earle Dillon, who last week in the Federal Court at Statesville was convicted of stealing rolls of newspapers from the Salisbury postoffice and was sentenced by Judge Boyd to two years in the government reformatory at Washington. Young Dillon is thirteen years of age and has been an incorrigible thief, having served two terms on the county roads after all other expedients to reform him had been tried by the local authorities.

Durham, April 27.—Arthur Duke was before the recorder a few days ago and he was sent to prison for thirty days because he would not answer questions touching where he had purchased whiskey. Duke was before the court on the charge of being drunk. There was evidence that showed he had purchased whiskey. After the court was over he was asked about the matter and said that he had no information to give. He was committed to jail for thirty days. He is now in jail and he refuses to divulge the source of supply or the source of information as to this whiskey supply.

Durham Herald: The directors of the proposed bible and training school, the project of Dr. James E. Shepard, have recommended that the school be located on the Duke site in Hayti. There are strings to these orders. The offer of Mr. Duke was twenty acres of land valued at \$4,500. He agrees to give half of that amount to the school and the reality comes at a most reasonable figure. There had been free sites from several places, Irmo, South Carolina, having had a bid at the institution with 280 acres. Hillsboro was in the eye of the builders and Greensboro has through its board of trade offered a considerable sum of money. The merchants' Association of this city negotiated for the Duke site and secured that liberal concession from Mr. Duke. The board of directors ask simply that the colored people raise the remainder of the amount and individual collections thus far have reached almost \$1,500. When the full amount has been secured it is believed that \$50,000 will be in readiness for the beginning. There are several philanthropists waiting with their \$5,000 checks. To erect the school, which is to be fashioned after the Northfield and Winona Lake schools, will cost \$150,000 in main buildings and there is to be an endowment of \$200,000. Dr. James E. Shepard is now on the final work of soliciting. He has visited all the big men from President Roosevelt. President Taft, Andrew Carnegie and the multimillionaires and has had luck. The school is to be especially for the colored ministry with chautauques, features. All signs are pointing to Durham and he is greatly encouraged with his subscriptions.
