

SPIRITS TURPENTINE

Greensboro Record, July 8.—The Southern's double-tracking force near the city is having a hard time, rain playing smash with its efforts, causing cave-ins and washouts galore.

Lenoir, July 9.—Policeman Willett Miller, who was seriously shot by Bill Baldwin at Blowing Rock Tuesday afternoon, died this morning at 6:30 o'clock. Baldwin is still in jail at Boon.

Mt. Olive, July 9.—Rev. Peter McIntyre, pastor of the Mt. Olive and Paisio, Presbyterian churches has received a call to the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church of Goldsboro. He has the matter under consideration.

Wadesboro, N. C., July 9.—The Atlantic Coast Line will build a line from Cheraw to Wadesboro, a distance of 25 miles. This road was surveyed in 1909, but a party of surveyors will go over the route and make a resurvey. The work will be completed as rapidly as possible. Eighty-five pound rail will be laid.

Laurinburg Exchange: The first cantaloupes that we have heard of in the county so far were grown by Mr. J. A. McColman, of Gibson, and shipped to New York by Mr. James T. Gibson. He had seven crates Monday. Other scattering shipments will be made this week, and next the business will go forward in full blast.

Salisbury, July 9.—Convicted of retailing in six cases John M. Freeman of Spencer was today fined \$250 and costs, aggregating \$50 or given a choice of six months on the county roads. He was chased from Spencer to Charlotte where he was caught early this week and brought to trial before Judge B. B. Miller, of Salisbury, who imposed the heaviest sentence yet given a Rowan retailer.

Salisbury Post: With the opening today by Mr. Josh Hoffer of an establishment on East Council street Salisbury now has nine resorts for those who thirst for near beer. When the tax was fixed at \$300 it was suggested by one citizen who really favored a prohibitive tax that this figure would keep the number of these concerns down to two or three. That this one is not gifted in prophesy is apparent.

Fayetteville Observer: "On Sunday afternoon Mr. George Godwin, a young white man, while under the influence of whiskey, quarreled with his wife because, it is said, she would not accompany him to Maxton, and wound up his spree by drinking an ounce of laudanum. Two physicians were hurriedly sent for and after heroic measures, he was brought around alright. He is 26 years old and was married only a few weeks ago."

Maxton Scottish Chief: Talking about corn, its price makes it well worth while that all that this section needs should be raised at home, and it can be done. If anyone doubts it, let him visit Mr. J. W. Carter, Mr. L. T. Cottingham and Mr. A. J. Cottingham, and each one will take him through their fields and make him acknowledge that it pays to raise corn. Statesville, N. C., July 9.—The Statesville near-beer dealers seem to be willing to take the risk in selling the beer until the city ordinance imposing a license tax of \$50 per annum, which went into effect the first instant, can be tested. Messrs. Turner Bros., who do business in the Hotel Irell building and who sell near-beer, have decided, on advice of counsel, to test the ordinance and after coming to this decision have resumed the business of dispensing the drink to the thirsty, which they had temporarily suspended. Mayor Grier, who returned from the firemen's tournament at Asheville last evening, will take action in the matter at once. If the Supreme Court should find that the beer is a legitimate subject of taxation the near-beer dealers of the State who are openly defying the provisions of the ordinance passed by various towns will find that "it is not so funny" to test laws after all.

Asheville, N. C., July 9.—The Asheville police are today wrestling with the problem of who the woman was, and where she is, that yesterday morning after hiring Addie Blasingame, a colored woman, as a nurse, and turned the child over to her, with a suit case to keep during the day on pretext of going to sew with friends, has departed and nothing more has been heard from her. The woman who the police have found has been here for some months, a few days ago went to the Western hotel, registering after some hesitancy as "Mrs. Gibbs, of Morganton." She was a neatly dressed and apparently well-bred woman, and had with her a four or five months old boy, who is a spry-looking fellow, although teething is not very fretful. In the suit case were clothes for the child, and everything points to a well-planned desertion. The child is being cared for by Mrs. Garren, until a home can be found.
