

SPIRITS TURPENTINE

—Rocky Mount, Sept. 16.—An additional story will be added to the Ricks Hotel. Work will be commenced at once.

—Burlington, Sept. 16.—The work of macadamizing the streets will be begun at once. Mr. C. L. Carter has been engaged to superintend the work. \$25,000 will be spent.

—Mr. W. T. Stewart, of Winston-Salem, is 36 years old and is the youngest grandfather in the United States. His daughter, who married a year ago, is a mother, and that makes Stewart the youngest grandfather.

—Raleigh, Sept. 16.—Today the attendance at the public schools of this city numbered 2,945 pupils, of which 1,841 are whites and 1,104 colored. The increase over last year's attendance is 407.

—Siler City, Sept. 16.—Mr. B. A. Phillips has been appointed county surveyor to succeed R. B. Clegg, who resigned. He will lay off a town for the Bonlee & Western Railway six miles from Causey. Work is progressing nicely on the new road.

—Wake Forest, Sept. 16.—The stockholders of the Royal Cotton Mill met Tuesday and declared a dividend of 6 per cent. Mr. W. C. Powell, of Savannah, Ga., president of the mill, came to attend the meeting, and is visiting friends on the hill.

—Troy, Sept. 16.—Sheriff McKenzie captured a blockade still last night in Rocky Springs township of 125-gallon capacity and poured out 900 gallons of beer and a quantity of whiskey. Sheriff McKenzie has captured several recently, but this is the largest ever seen in this section.

—Raleigh News and Observer: Mr. E. L. Worthem, soil expert of the test farm force, reported yesterday for service to the Department of Agriculture. He is from the soil bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture, and has seen much service. He is a graduate of the University of Illinois.

—Fayetteville Index: Mrs. W. H. Powell is another successful farmer. This year she had a plot of ground in her garden 50x160 feet, about one-sixth of an acre, planted in Noah Biggs corn. From the plot she sold \$20 worth of roasting ears and furnished her table for three weeks. The forage from the patch was worth \$5, making \$25 from the little piece of ground.

—Lexington Dispatch: The first steam shovel to get to work on the Southbound was one belonging to Purcell, Shehan & Co., just below town. Lexington is the leading Southbound point. This stunt speaks well for the contractors and for the surveying corps in this section, chief of whom is Resident Engineer H. Morton Stephens.

—Charlotte Observer, Sept. 17.—Herman Beattie, the young son of the late Thomas Beattie, met a horrible death yesterday morning when he was caught in the shafting at the gin of Mr. E. R. Spurrier in Paw Creek township and mangled terribly by the revolving machinery. His right arm was literally jerked from his body, while he was being whirled around and one entire side was shattered.

—Washington, D. C., Sept. 16.—For the purpose of personally inspecting the experiment of converting swamps in North Carolina into arable land, Assistant Secretary Hayes, of the Department of Agriculture, left Washington today for Hyde county, N. C. He will be gone nearly a week. The project of draining these swamps is proceeding under the advice of experts in the department.

—Newbern Sun: Game is reported to be over plentiful this year, especially deer and bear. A Mr. Dixon, who returned from the Davis Shore section, in Carteret county, says that he has never seen the like. Two others with himself, went hunting in the persimmon at the head of South river a few days ago and killed, each a deer in a few hours, and as they were returning home killed another—a fine buck.

—Winston-Salem Journal: That a bank in Winston-Salem should take in on deposit over \$275,000 in the course of one day's business is a significant fact. That is the record of the Wachovia Loan and Trust Company for yesterday. And the statement of Mr. Thomas Maslin, secretary of the company, that these deposits—from regular customers—came into the bank in comparatively small amounts makes the fact doubly significant.

—Newton Enterprise: The preaching at Bandy's store by the strange religionists is still drawing large crowds and people from that section say there is no little excitement in the community. Some of the converts go into a trance, we are told, and remain unconscious for hours, and a platform has been erected on which to dance, the holy dance. Speaking in unknown tongues by the converts is another feature.

—Raleigh, Sept. 16.—The expert who puts up the special chairs in which criminals are electrocuted has arrived here and reported to the penitentiary officials, and the chair is expected to come from New York in a short time so it will be ready for use for Morrison in October and for another man doomed for the gallows if the Supreme Court, which now has the latter case in hand, decides that the man must die in the chair.

—Winston-Salem, Sept. 16.—Recorder Hastings let it be known today that he was no respecter of persons and that white and black would receive the same consideration when convicted of violating the State prohibition law. John Young, a picture agent, was declared guilty of retailing in two cases and the recorder gave him 11 months on the roads. Young plead his own case, begging his honor to reduce the sentence, but Recorder Hastings informed the defendant that he has little sympathy for intelligent white men who boldly violate the law.
