The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact: The homestead of any resident of this State shall not be subject to the lien of any judgment or decree of any court, or to sale under execution, or other process thereon, growing out of any debt contracted, or cause of action accruing, after the first day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy. seven except such as may be rendered or issued to secure the payment of obligations contracted for the payment of homestead, or for la-borers or mechanics liens for work done and performed for the claimant of said homestead, or for lawful taxes. Sed. 2. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

Packard, New Orleans, La.—In answer to your dispatch of this date, the President directs me to say that he feels it his duty to state, frankly, that he does not believe public opinion will longer support the maintenance of the State government in Louisiana by the use of the military, and that he must concur in this manifest feeling. The troops will hereafter, as in the past, protect life and property from mob violence when the State authorities fail, but under the remaining days of his official life they will not be used to establish or to pull down either claimant for the control of the State. It is not his purpose to recognize either claimant.

Weshington, D. C., March 8d, 1877.—Zo
Gov. R. J. Nicholis, New Orleans: The President says he sent a dispatch to Packard. Thursday, notifying him that troops could no longer be employed to uphold either claimant, and that he does not believe that Packard would attempt any offensive operations. The President sent the dispatch so that he might have time to retire his pre-tensions if disposed. The President says instructions have been issued which cancel all orders for the preservation of the status quo, and that neither you or Packard are bound to observe it; that he means the peo-ple of Louisiana are as free in their affairs from federal interference as the people of Connecticut, and that there will be no disposition to interfere with them any more o'clock, as the time for the election, than with the people of New York. 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
