The Agricultural Department.

From an Article by the Commissioner Monthly Bulletin. The conditions of agriculture tend to separate those engaged in its pursuit. The farmer is seated on his own land, and the nature of his avocations engross all of his time. His business begins with the dawn and ends with the dusk. His opportunities of communication with others are necessarily very limited. The elections and the courts are the only occasions which bring them together in any considerable number, and then

the exciting topics growing out of such occasions exclude all others. One of the objects contemplated at the time when this provision of the constitution was carried into effect was to provide a medium of communication between all those engaged in this pursuit. It was estab-lished mainly to meet the wants of the agriculturist, and to be subservient to his interest. It was intended to supply information not only as to the culture of all existing staples, but as to new industries and the best methods of prosecuting them. The aim was to make any fortunate discoveries which might be made in agriculture at once known to all who had an interest in them-to make the knowledge possessed by a few advanced men the common property of all. It was thought that a new spirit would be thus infused into the farming community and the standard of agriculture be advanced throughout the State. Experience has demonstrated that the principle of voluntary association cannot be relied on to accomplish these objects. Without the Department of Agriculture the farmers of the State would be without any common and constant medium of communication. Except as a part of the State organization it may be regarded as proven that none such can exist. That it has fulfilled, all the expectations which have been entertained of it cannot be affirmed. For any disappointment that may have been felt good reasons may be assigned: First, the two sanguine expectations then entertained-expectations which no institution could have realized; secondly, the necessity of time to perfect arrangements which are to operate throughout a large State, and upon hundreds of thousands of people. A comparison between the condition of the State at the time of the estab lishment of the Department and its condition each year since, or a reference to the statistics of each year, will show that a great impetus has been given to agriculture here. It is believed that by a prudent avoidance of mistakes inevitable under a new system, by a wise application of improved methods which experience has taught, by a more intimate correspondence on the part of agriculturists with the Department, which is earnestly invited, its scope of usefulness can be indefinitely extended.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

MILITARY PREPARATIONS IN IRELAND CRITICISM OF JOHN BRIGHT AND HIS COURSE-ARREST OF HOME RULERS -ENGLISH TROOPS DEFEATED BY THE BOERS-THE BOYCOTT RELIEF FUND -EMIGRATION OF JEWS FROM GERMANY.

(By Cable to the Morning Star.) London, December 24 .- The correspondent of the Times at Dublin says that the movement of troops has excited a very uneasy feeling. It is generally believed that the Government possesses information warranting an apprehension of danger. The Government has made very complete preparations for any emergency. Immense supplies of provisions, tents and other campaigning requisites have been stored in central depots. It is stated that all these preparations point to the conclusion that the Government believes that far greater danger than is seen lurks behind.

A storeship has arrived from Woolwich with 20,000 rounds of buckshot and a large quantity of ball, cartridges and entrenching tools. Another vessel is shipping similar cargoes at Woolwich for new stations at Broff, Mohill, Carrick-on-Shannon and Bally-Shannon, which will be occupied by troops. These positions are well chosen, being centres of the disturbed districts, from which troops could operate in various directions. At all stations where cavalry are quartered without infantry the supply of ammunition will be increased to fifty rounds per man.

London, December 24.—The Earl of Carnavaron publishes an open letter to John Bright, chanceller of the duchy of Lancaster, protesting against the latter's speech at Birmingham on the 16th of November last, in which he condemned the land laws of Ireland and attributed the state of affaire in that country to the rejection of the compensation for disturbance bill by the House of Lords. The Earl of Carnavaron declares that holding sentiments so avowededly republican and hostile to the crown and the House of Lords, Mr. Bright ought to be able conscientiously to remain a member of the Cabinet for a single day. He contrasts Mr. Bright's mild censure of lawlessness and crime in Ireland with his scathing rebuke of those guilty of owning

The following telegram has been received at the War Office from Durban: Two hundred and fifty men of the 94th regiment, marching from Lidenburg to Pretoria, have been stracked and overpowered by the Boers, 129 being killed and wounded and the rest taken prisoners. The colors were saved. This is probably the same fight which was reported in a dispatch as having taken place at Middleburg. It will alter the situation, on account of the encouragement it will give the Biers.
