

An Act to Amend the Official Advertising Statute.

The following bill was passed by the last Legislature in regard to official advertising, and we publish it for the benefit of the sheriffs of the different counties in this section:

Section 1. That notices of every sale of real estate, made by order of any court, or sale under execution, shall be published once a week for four weeks, immediately preceding such sale in a newspaper (if any there be) published in the county wherein such sale is to be made.

Section 2. That the notices, required by section 45, chapter 45, of Battle's Revisal, shall be published once a week for four weeks in a newspaper (if any there be) published in the county: Provided, That the costs thereof shall not, in any case, exceed two dollars.

Section 3. That the annual statement of county commissioners, required by section 13 of chapter 27, Battle's Revisal, shall be published in a newspaper (if any there be) published in the county: Provided, That the cost of the same shall not exceed a half a cent a word.

Section 4. That the annual report of the county finance committee shall be published in a newspaper (if any there be) published in the county: Provided, That the cost of the same shall not exceed a half a cent a word.

Section 5. That all laws and clauses of laws in conflict with this act be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 6. That this act shall be in force from and after the first day of March, A. D. 1881.

A QUEER RAILROAD SCHEME. Jay Gould Coming Down to Florence, South Carolina.

Special to the New York Herald. FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., March 26.—Quite a ripple of excitement was created here yesterday by the appearance on our streets of Mr. L. W. Humphrey, a former railroad president in this State, who was understood to represent Jay Gould, and was said to be negotiating for the purchase of the Fayetteville & Florence Railroad.

Rumor says that Mr. Gould proposes to build a road from Norfolk, Va., via Fayetteville to Florence. Should such a road be consummated it is said this would give Gould the shortest and most direct through railroad route from the Atlantic to the Pacific, which line will run through the whole cotton belt, with a direct outlet to Europe at Norfolk.

There is a charter for the Fayetteville & Florence Railroad, grading on which was done eight or nine years ago from Fayetteville to Shoe Heel, on the Carolina Central Railway. Mr. McKean, of this city, is the president of the road. There is also a charter for a road from Fayetteville to Goldsboro, and another from thence to the Virginia State line in the direction of and in an air line with Norfolk. These two charters were consolidated by the North Carolina Legislature last winter.

Mr. Humphrey says that money has been raised to build the road from Florence to the Virginia line, but whether he really represents Gould or has succeeded in his negotiations has not been divulged. If these reports prove true speculation as to Gould's scheme for a route to and an outlet on the Atlantic seaboard for his southern system of railroads may be set at rest.

ANOTHER ACCOUNT OF IT. The Winston (N. C.) Sentinel says: "A company of Northern and English capitalists are anxious to get control of the Fayetteville and Florence Railroad for the purpose of consolidating the same with a new contemplated road from Norfolk, via Snow Hill, Goldsboro, Fayetteville and Shoe Heel, to Columbia, S. C."

The Virginia Midland Extension in a Nutshell. Wash. Correspondent Dispatch. The McCulloch bill, which the debt-payers of Virginia advocated, fixes the debt at \$32,000,000, makes the rate of interest an average of 4 per cent, makes coupons receivable for taxes and other dues to the State, and the bonds non-taxable. This bill was agreed upon by the creditors and the State authorities. The Riddleberger bill, which the Readjusters advocate, fixes the debt at less than \$20,000,000, makes the coupons non-receivable for taxes, &c., and the bonds taxable. It fixes the rate of interest at 3 per cent, and its authors neither sought nor had any conference with the creditors. The creditors oppose it.

To Sheriffs. Raleigh Visitor. The synopsis of the new revenue act which went the rounds of the State press recently contained an error. In that synopsis, retail dealers of malt liquors only were placed upon the same footing with dealers in spirituous liquors. There is a distinction between these dealers—retail dealers of malt liquors only are to pay a license or of thirty-five dollars per year in advance, while persons who sell all kinds of liquors, cordials or bitters, in quantities less than a gallon, shall pay a license tax of sixty dollars per year in advance. In either case the license is not to be issued for a shorter time than twelve months.

CAPITONS AND SUMMARY OF ACTS OF THE LEGISLATURE, PASSED AT SESSION OF 1881.

An act to authorize the county commissioners of the county of Harriet to levy a special tax. Ratified March 11.

An act to enable the county commissioners of certain counties, in their discretion, to regulate the amount of the sheriff's or tax collector's bonds. This applies to Columbus and Franklin counties. Ratified March 11.

An act to incorporate the bank of Craven. Ratified March 11.

An act to repeal section 4, chapter 117, of the laws of 1879. Repels so much of said act as requires an analysis to be made at coroner's inquests. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend chapter 27, Battle's Revisal. Relates to county commissioners, and substitutes the words "December and June" for "September and March," wherever they occur in said chapter. Ratified March 11.

An act to incorporate the Raleigh Street Railway Company. Ratified March 11.

An act to protect fish in Lumber river, in the counties of Columbus and Robeson. Makes it a misdemeanor to take fish in said river between March 1st and November 1st, by any other means than hook and line. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend the charter of the town of Beaufort. Ratified on the 11th of March.

An act for the support of the Penitentiary and convicts for the years 1881-82. Appropriates \$75,000 per annum for the support and guarding the convicts. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend section 25, of chapter 104, Battle's Revisal. Relates to ditches and drains through lands of adjacent owners. Ratified March 11.

An act concerning representation in the House of Representatives. Changes the former representation by giving Mecklenburg three members; Franklin and Northampton two members, and takes from Caswell, Craven, Duplin, Rowan and Wilkes, one member each. Ratified March 11.

An act to provide for additional servants in the various departments. 375. An act to designate the holidays to be observed and dates when papers will be due. Makes January 1st, February 22d, May 10th, May 20th, July 4th, and Thanksgiving Day and 25th of December public holidays, and regulates the payment of commercial paper falling due on those days. Ratified March 11.

An act to extend the time to redeem lands sold for taxes. Extends the same to January 1, 1882. Ratified March 11.

An act concerning representation in the Senate. This act retains the former Senatorial districts except it puts Pender with New Hanover, in the twelfth district; gives to the fifteenth district, composed of the counties of Columbus and Robeson, two Senators; makes the twenty-second district consist of Chatham and Alamance, with one Senator, and gives Guilford alone one Senator. Ratified March 11.

An act to incorporate the Western Insane Asylum. Incorporates the North Carolina Insane Asylum, and creates a board of nine directors for its management, to be divided into three classes, whose office shall be vacated in 1883-'85-'87.

An act to establish a public road through the State's land and to improve the same. Provides for laying out a road through the public lands in Craven and Jones counties.

An act to supply the North Carolina Insane Asylum with pure water. An act to make dogs listed for taxation the subject of larceny. Provides that dogs listed shall be the subject of larceny. The tax shall be one dollar, to be applied to the common school fund. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend section 11, chapter 70, Battle's Revisal. Relates to enticing servants from employers. Ratified March 11.

An act to abolish fences in Warren county. This act makes it unlawful for any live stock to run at large in Warren county. Said act to be submitted to the voters of said county. Ratified March 11.

An act to facilitate the settlement of executors and administrators and guardians. This act allows the administrator, &c., to pay to the Judge of Probate moneys, &c., belonging to legatees and contributors, and for administrators or guardians to turn in assets to the Judge of Probate. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend chapter 34, section 1, laws of 1873 and 1874. This act refers to the marshal of the Supreme Court, changing his salary from \$2 per diem to \$500 per annum, payable monthly.

An act to amend the laws prescribing the duties of coroners. Prescribes that it shall not be requisite to hold an inquest without probable cause. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend the charter of the town of Mount Olive, in Wayne county.

An act to amend section 2, chapter 126, Battle's Revisal. This act makes the amount of bonds to be given by the commissioner of wrecks \$4,000. Ratified March 11.

An act to allow the county commissioners to place the names of school committeemen in the jury box. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend chapter 284, laws of 1879. Makes it the duty of solicitors to discharge witnesses at the end of criminal actions and to give certificates, and no such witness shall be paid without such certificate. Ratified March 11.

An act supplemental to an act ratified February 23, 1881, to provide for the erection of a monument to the late Gov. Richard Caswell. Allows Gov. Jarvis, in his discretion, to have the Caswell monument erected on the public square in Kinston. Ratified March 11.

An act to extend the time for the registration of deeds and other conveyances. Extends the time two years. An act to prohibit the sale of spirituous or intoxicating liquors within two miles of the colored Missionary Baptist Church, at Best Station, in Wayne county.

An act to amend chapter 76 of Battle's Revisal. Refers to notaries public, requires them to renew their bonds every two years. Those now in office to renew by July 1, 1881. Ratified March 11.

An act to incorporate the town of Lewiston, in the county of Bertie. Ratified March 11.

The Proposed Extension of the Virginia Midland Railroad. Charlotte Observer, 31st.

A letter received here yesterday from a gentleman residing in Baltimore expresses the opinion that the Virginia Midland extension to Charlotte is still contemplated, notwithstanding the recent lease of the Air-Line by the Richmond & Danville Railroad Company. It is said that Baltimore merchants have taken the matter so much to heart that a public meeting has been called, and the opinion prevails that the business exigencies of the Monumental City altogether require the penetration of at least one railroad from there into the cotton belt, and that the business men there are ready to put their shoulders to the wheel. The Virginia Midland is now regarded as a Baltimore road, and as it butts up against the Richmond & Danville Railroad combination at Danville, there is no friendly Southern outlet. Baltimore capital says it must and will have one, and the project of a connecting link between Danville and Charlotte must be built.

Historic Memorials in Bladen. This county is very rich and fertile; and the scene of many Revolutionary incidents; the fights at Elizabethtown occurred right in the centre of this town; it was then that Col. Shegby, a British officer, fell, who, by the way, was the father-in-law of the original Bingham, of Bingham School fame. Brown's Creek, just below, was where Cornwallis stopped to water his army on his retreat from Guilford C. H., and also where Maj. Webster, of the British army, was buried, for whose remains the British Government afterward offered a large reward. Cornwallis was then on his way to Wilmington to effect a junction with Sir Peter Parker in command of the Royal naval forces at that place. Cornwallis' story is related in reference to an attempt to disinter the body of Maj. Webster by the late Joseph Toomer, Mr. Maurice Moore, of Brunswick county, and others, which may be given in my next. Brompton Castle, the residence of Gov. Johnston, of Colonial times, is just above this place on the plantation of Duncan Cromartie, Esq. The remains of the old foundations are yet to be seen. McDonald, the husband of Flora, and Commandant of the Tory forces, passed through this county and afterwards met Col. Moore, Caswell and others in command of the patriot forces at Moore's creek bridge, resulting in the capture of McDonald's chest, McDonald's death, and the complete overthrow of his forces. It was here that Col. Brown and Robeson lived and died, full of years and honors; doing as much as any two men in the then U. S. to achieve our independence of the mother country. It was in honor of the latter that the present adjoining county of Robeson was named.

The steamer Henry Frank, from Memphis, arrived at New Orleans yesterday with a cargo of 9,236 bales of cotton, 1,250 sacks of cotton seed, 1,324 sacks of oil cake, 750 sacks of corn, 500 sacks of meal and sundries. This exceeds the champion cargo of 1879 by 883 bales.
