A QUEER : BAILHOAD SCHEME. Jay Gould Coming Down to Florence. South Carolina,

Special to the New York Herald. FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., March 26 .-Quite a ripple of excitement was created here yesterday by the appearance on our streets of Mr. L. W. Humphrey, a former railroad president in this State, who was understood to represent Jay Gould, and was said to be negotiating for the purchase of the Fayetteville & Florence Railroad. Rumor says that Mr. Gould proposes to build a road from Norfolk, Va., via Fayetteville to Florence. Should such a road be consummated it is said this would give Gould the shortest and most direct through railroad route from the Atlantic to the Pacific, which line will run through the whole cotton belt, with a direct outlet to Europe at Norfolk. There is a charter for the Fayetteville & Florence Railroad, grading on which was done eight or nine years ago from Fayetteville to Shoe Heel, on the Car-olina Central Railway. Mr. Mc-Kealhan, of this city, is the president of the road. There is also a charter for a road from Fayetteville to Goldsboro, and another from thence to the Virginia State line in the dis-rection of and in an air line with Norfolk. These two charters were consolidated by the North Carolina Legislature last winter. Mr. Humphrey says that money has been raised to build the road from Florence to the Virginia line, but whether he reslly represents Gould or has succeeded in his negotiations has not been divulged. 


A letter received here yesterday from a gentleman residing in Baltimore expresses the opinion that the Virginia Midland extension to Charlotte is still contemplated, notwithstanding the recent lease of the Air-Line by the Richmond & Danville Railfoad Company. It is said that Baltimore merchants have taken the matter so much to heart that a public meeting has been called, and the opinion prevails that the business exigencies of the Monumental City absolutely require the penetration of at least one railroad from there into the cotton belt, and that the business men there are ready to put their shoulders to the wheel. The Virginia Midland is now regarded as a Baltimore road, and as it butts up against the Rich-mond & Danville Railroad combination at Danville, there is no friendly Southern outlet. Baltimore capital says it must and will have one, and the project of a connecting link between Danville and Charlotte must be built.
