THE GHOSTS OF TO-DAY.

The Mysterious Warning in the Earl of Airlie's Family.

From the London Telegraph Mrs. Ann Day, (formerly Gladden) of 31 Burgoyne road, S. W., writes questioning the statement of Mr. Macleod that the traditional warning of impending disaster in the Airlie family consists only of the sound of a drum. She says:

Early in the year 1845 I went to Cortachy Castle in attendance upon Miss Margaret Dalrymple, who was paying a two days' visit to the Earl and Countess of Airlie. We arrived late in the evening, and Miss Dalrymple had only just time to dress for dinner. As she rested for a few minutes on the sofa, however, (this she told me some time after we had left the castle), she heard distinctly, as if immediately beneath the floor, the sound of fifes and afterward the beating of a drum. While at dinner she remarked to Lord Airlie, who sat near her, "What is that strange music you have about the house? You assuredly have an excellent piper." Lord Airlie, without reply-ing, dropped his knife and fork and retired from the dining room. Later in the evening the place seemed to be all in confusion, and I learned that Lord Airlie, after leaving the table, went to the library and dined

The next morning, while the family were at breakfast, I was quite alone in Miss Dalrymple's room, and as I stood before the fire I heard, as I thought, a carriage drive up, and stop dead, directly under my feet. Immediately there followed the sound of another carriage driving up and stopping in exactly the same manner. And then, as if following the vehicles, came the tramp, tramp, tramp of marching soldiers. Then I heard some shrill notes of the fife so distinetly that I looked round instinctively, expecting to see a piper in the room. In another moment I was still more startled by the beating of a drum. About this there was something indescribably disagreeable; it seemed as if the drummer were making his way through the floor. Being a perfect stranger to the place, I thought there might be a coach road and an entrance door to the castle, near the room in which I stood, and that some distinguished guests were arriving or departing. On looking out of the window, however, I found that there was no door or coach road near, and not a human being was to be seen. I concluded, therefore, that the sounds must have been echoed from a distance.

The next morning before our departure, Lady Airlie came to the door of Miss Dalrymple's room, to give her a £5 note for an orphan school in which she was interested. Neither of us ever saw the Countess again. She was confined of twins at Brighton some months afterward. and died. It was not until Miss Dalrymple, a few days after we left the castle, asked me if I had heard "the strange music there," that I disclosed my experience, and then for the first time I learned from her the tradition about the Airlie drummer boy. She told me that she herself had been totally in ignorance of it until her allusion at the dinner table to the music she had heard elicited from another guest an explanation.



American horses never gained such a victory before in England as Foxhall did in his last race. Our exchanges are very full of the particulars. He ran against the fastest horses in the British Kingdom, carrying large extra weight. It was his seventh victory. It is conceded to have been the great race, taken altogether, of record. A special from Newmarket, England, says:

Thirty-two horses started. After two breaks away there was a fairly good start. Shinglass made the run-ning from Knight of Athol, Piræus, and Montrose, the most prominent of the second lot being Philammon, Bend Or, Lucy Glitters, Tristan and Foxhall. The rear lot consisted of Peter, Mistake, and Etona II. There was but little change for half a mile, when Lucy Glitters took the lead, with Foxball, Philammon, Tristan, Incendiary, Piræus and Poulet close up. When a little over a quarter of a mile from home, Lucy Glitters was leading Foxhall and Tristan by half a length, with Mistake close up. On the lower ground this order was maintained past the red post. When drawing near home Foxhall closed up and, going on, won comfortably, but by a head only before Lucy Glitters, who was separated from Tristan by a neck. It was a fine race from the distance pole. * * * The achievement of Foxhall is the greatest in the history of the turf. He has not only added the great Cambridgeshire Stakes to the long list of American victories, but he has done what no other horse has done before him. Handicapped originally at 112 pounds, he carried an additional load of 14 pounds, the penalty incurred for winning the Cesarewitch, in all 126 pounds: Hitherto the heaviest weight ever carried by a winner of this race was 121 pounds, and that by a four-year old. Moreover, he has beaten Bend Or, everywhere acknowledged the finest race horse in England, and who, since his defeat of Iroquois, was counted upon by Englishmen as a sure winner of the Cambridgeshire, Foxhall has now to

We copy a part: It had been raining for days, and the track must have been very heavy -a perfect quagmire; and then Foxhall was very heavily weighted with 126 pounds. I feared that Lucy Glitters might win, for she is very fast and carried only 91 pounds. She was a good third in the St. Leger, and as it was Foxhall has beaten her by only a neck. It is noticeable that with the exception of Foxhall, all of the heavily weighted horses were nowhere in the race. The great crack Bend Or did not even get a place, and he was ridden by Archer. Watts, the jockey who rode Foxhall, is a very trustworthy man from Marsh's stables. He was put on the horse because the first-class jockeys were all engaged. This makes the victory of the American horse all the more emphatic, for the English cannot again claim that

the jockey won. "People in this country," Mr. Keene continued, "do not comprehend the magnitude of his victory. It is a thing unprecedented that a three-year-old carrying 126 pounds, should beat all the crack horses of England. It is the most wonderful event on record in racing annals.




