

TENNESSEE TOTAL Fatal Shooting Afray at Knoxville Growing Out of an Old Fond-One Man Killed and Another Fatally Wounded.

Wounded. By Telegraph to the Morning Star.] KNOXVILLE, August 26 —A fatal shoot-ing affray occurred here to-day, in which Moses Lusby was shot through the breast and instantly killed, and his son. Dan Lus-by, through the body and fatally wounded. The shooting was done between these two men on one side, and Gen. Jos. A. Mabry and his son Jos. A. Mabry, Jr., on the other. Dan Lusby is the man who mur-dered Wm. C. Mabry, a son of Gen. Ma-bry, last Christmas eve. On his trial for the murder the jury disagreed, and Dan the murder the jury disagreed, and Dan Lusby was released on ball. This morn-ing Dan Lusby abused Gen. Mabry on the street and threatened to kill him. Dan was arrested by the chief marshal, but resisted arrest. His father attempted to rescue him, but he was taken to the City Hall before the recorder. When the chief marshal and policemen attempted to disarm him the Mabrys were present as witnesses, and engaged in the scuffle in which the Lusbys were shot. When killed Moses Lusby had one pistol in his hand and an-other in his pocket. Dan Lusby also had two pistols. An examination at the Coroner's inquest failed to develop who did the shooting. The Mabrys gave themselves up and gave bail.
