COTTON. New York, May 11.—The movement of the crop, as indicated by our telegrams from the South to-night, is given below. For the week ending this evening (May 11) the total receipts have reached 36,223 bales, against 32,603 bales last week, 30,641 bales the previous week, and 27,980 bales three weeks since making the total receipts since the 1st of Sept., 1887, 5,292,039 bales, against 5,147,807 bales for the same period of 1886, showing an increase since Sept. 1, 1887, of 144,192 bales.

Message to the Front. (Wilmington News.) The time is rapidly approaching when the representatives of the Democratic party will assemble in Raleigh to declare their choice for the nomination for Governor. We should be untrue to what we believe to be the best interests of the State, if we failed to call attention to the necessity of placing before the people a candidate by a calculator to win a fight upon which so much depends. It is idle to deny that the contest in North Carolina will be serious and if we have not a proper leader, doubtful. We believe Lt. Gov. Stedman to be by far the most available candidate for Governor who can be brought before the people of the State. We challenge investigation both as to his private and political life. His record is spotless. He has no explanations to make either to friend or foe—no defensive warfare to wage; but from the beginning to the ending of the campaign he carried on a noble and fearless fight, neither asking nor giving anything in return. We call upon every white man in the State to support every party to point out one single element of weakness in his candidacy, and we pause for a reply. He has never been connected with any immoral or dishonest transaction, stands forth untrammelled as the exponent of the pure political faith of our fathers. A soldier with a stainless record from Bebel to Appomattox, no words but those of love and devoted affection have ever been heard from him for the memory of his dead comrades who fell so gloriously in the great struggle, and whenever you find a Confederate soldier, or a man of a mangled body and politics mentioned, his eyes will brighten and his speech quicken as nine times out of ten he will say, "I am for Stedman forever!"

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FIFTIETH CONGRESS. FIRST SESSION. Senator Turpin's Title to his Seat Considered—TARIF Debate Continued in the House. By Telegraph to the Morning Star. WASHINGTON, May 10.—Mr. Stewart, of Nevada, introduced a bill proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, so as to reduce from two-thirds to a majority the vote in each house over-riding Presidential vetoes.

SENATE. Mr. Morrill, of Vermont, from the Committee on Rules, reported, and the House adopted a resolution providing that general debate on the tariff bill shall be confined to Saturday next. Under the call of the Senate a number of bills were introduced and referred. The House then went into Committee of the Whole, (Mr. Springer in the chair), on the tariff bill, and was addressed by Mr. Hatcher.
