The legislator who goes outside of the authority vested in hlm as a representative of the people to enact laws to take from one man his earnings and give them to another, steals power which does not belong to him and practically steals the earnings which he helps to legislate out of the hands of one person into the hands of another, and when this is done for a partisan purpose, to secure a part of the plunder from the beneficiaries of the plunder to perpetuate the power of the party which enacts the legislation then there is a double crime, for there is bribery and stealing too.

Is there a man living with sense enough to name the days of the week who believes that if the protected manufacturers had not contributed as liberally as they have to keep the Republican party in power they would have secured all this so-called "protection" from Republican Congresses ?
