It took years of hard, pesistent contention to recover even partial recognition of State sovereignty. It has not been fully recovered yet.

Thirty years ago there were no such fi ancial problems to confront as we have to-day, some of them the direct and some of them the indirect outgrowth of these four years of internecine strife. There were United States Bank issues which became national and for a time exciting, there were questions as to the currency, but there were no questions involving the whole financial system of the Government as there are now.

Then there was no question about the coinage of silver, for every man who had a pound of silver could have of this goes there to stay, for but it coined and get its full value in little of it comes back, and it takes silver dollars for it.

Then there was no question about greenbacks, and their redemption, for there were no greenbacks.


