THE LUETGERT TRIAL. Jury Bull Uasble to Agree-Juror Harley

Holds Out For Lustgert, By Telegraph to the Morning Star, CHICAGO, October 20 .- At 8.80 tonight it was announced from the office of State's Attorney Dencen that there would be no announcement of a verdict

in the Luctgert case before the opening of Court to-morrow morning. For a time to-night it was rumored that if the jary had not agreed by to-morrow it will be discharged as soon as it reports its inability to reach a verdict. This, however, is not the case. It is the firm determination of Judge Tuthili to keep the jary until Saturday night or late Saturday afternoon before he permits them to go with a disagreement. He has announced that both State and defendant

have spent so much money and time and the case has been so long and d fficult to try that he will not consent to the discharge of the jury until there is absolutely no hope whatever of a verdict being reach.

The jury stands about where it stood twenty-four hours ago Reports vary from nice for the death penal v to three for acquittal to eleven for death and one for acquittal. The one juror holding out for Luctgert is Harley, and it is thought that if he would change front there would be little time lost in arrivng at a verdict. Juror Holabird is also credited with favoring the acquittal of the prisoner, but it is thought he will come around quickly if Harley could b: induced to vote for conviction.

The feeling among the jurors who are a favor of the death penalty is high against Harley, and they have done much talking to him. At one time this morning they even sent for Judge Tuthill to know, among other things, if eleven men could compel one man to vote with them, or if a verdict would be valid if but eleven men signed it. This is the incident that gave to the State the idea that but one man was standing between Luetgert and a death sentence. It is rumored that Judge Tuthill this morning opened three letters offering bribes to the jary. This report cannot be varified.





English Naval Troubles Those unduly pessimistic souls who have been overimpressed by the series of accidents which have occurred in Uncle Sam's navy should read the Hampshire Telegraph, an English newspaper which makes a specialty of naval notes and news. On one page of a single recent issue the following startling and self explanatory headlines occur: "On a Dangerous Course. Grounding of the Galatea. Navigator's Serious Mistake." "Shocking Accident on H. M. S. Howe. Three Men Frightfully Injured." "Accident on Board H. M. S. Blake. Seaman Fatally Crushed. Two Artificers and a Stoker Scalded." Another headline has in it a certain amount of humor. It reads, "Shocking Occurrence on the Sans Pareil." The shocking occurrence was the death of a gunner who tried to put seven pints of rum under his skin, and succeeded, but did not live to enjoy the proceeding. -Philadelphia Press.

Arms and Legs.

According to the result of many measurements made at the Anthropological laboratory in London, the right arm in human beings is in a majority of cases longer than the left arm, while, on the contrary, the left leg is longer than the right leg. Sometimes, however, the relative proportions are exactly reversed, out very seldom does perfect equality exist between the two sides. The tendency of the right arm to exceed the left arm in strength is somewhat greater in men than in women, while equality of strength in the two arms occurs almost twice as frequently with women as with men.

There her young are born and raised to sturdy cub estate. When a cowboy locates a den in hich he believes the entire family to be gathered, a composite mass of cotton, saturated with damp flour sulphur and ther noxious smelling substances, is thrust into the den and set on fire. The month of the hole is then filled with clay tamped down solidly, and the imprisoned wolves are speedily suffocated
