CUPS FOR THE RALEIGH.

Twelve Artistic Vessels to be Presented to the Cruiser by North Carolinians.

[Baltimore Sun.] An artistic set of punch cups to be presented to the cruiser Raleigh by Mrs. Alfred W. Haywood, of Haw

River, N. C., has just been completed by Messrs. Jacobi & Jenkins, silversmiths.

Mrs. Haywood, who is a daughter of Governor Holt, of North Carolina, was sponsor for the cruiser at the time ot her christening. The cups are twelve in number and weigh 100 ounces Troy. Each cup is four inches high and three inches in diameter, resting upon four dolphins, whose bodies curve gracefully about the body of the up. They are highly polished and lined with gold. They are of the same design as the massive punch bowl which was presented to the cruiser by citizens of North Carolina when she first went into commission.

The Raleigh is a second-rate cruise of 3.313 tons displacement. Her tonnage is 1,363. She formed part of Admiral Dewey's squadron and is now on the Asiatic station.
