

She Will Remain in Cape Fear Waters Until 3.00 O'clock Monday Afternoon.

ENTERTAINMENT CEREMONIES

Formal Presentation of Trophy to City Raleigh at The Orton-Trip to the Cruiser-The Cape Fear Club's Reception:

The most notable ceremony yester day, in connection with the visit of Captain Coghlan and the officers of the cruiser Raleigh to this city, was the formal presentation of the Nordenfeldt cannon to the city of Raleigh by the officers of the cruiser, which oc curred about 10 o'clock in the parlors of The Orton. The trophy was, as noted in yesterday's issue, informally presented to a committee of Raleigh gentlemen Friday on board the cruiser.

At the formal ceremony yesterday the officers of the Raleigh, the-delegation from the city of Raleigh, and quite a party of Wilmingtonians were present. Captain Coghlan made the presentation speech. He said:

"I take this occasion, gentlemen, of ormally presenting to you here in the oresence of my fellow officers a gun recovered from the Spanish cruiser Reina Christina In doing so, we do not claim that we took any more part than the other vessels of the American squadron in the destruction of the lagship of the Spanish fleet, "Raleigh is an inland city and the

cruiser bearing her name can never visit her/people It is for this reason that we present this gift. We desire that the city might know that all on seard always had in mind that fair city with whose name she has been honored. Hence the trophy. "We hope you will accept it in the spirit in which it is given; not from is intrinsic value, but as an expression of love and esteem of the officers and crew for the people of the city that has given the cruiser her name.

The speech of acceptance on the part of the city was by R. N. Simms, Esq., one of the most brilliant junior members of the Raleigh bar. His speech was as follows:

GENTLEMEN-To me has been delegated the honor of receiving this trophy at your hands. In behalf, therefore, of the Mayor and the citizens of Raleigh h accept it and render to you our thanks. It is a fitting token to come from you to us. It is the appropriate trophy for those who bear North Caro lina's capital's name to bring back to North Carolina's soil. It is well that you come bearing the spoils of victory, for North Carolina, like the Roman mother, desires to see her sons return with their shields or upon them. If we commend you for your bravery it is the commendation of a warlike people. North Carolina was first in the revolution, at Alamance and Mecklenburg; first in the civil war, at Bethel; first in the Spanish war, at Cardenas; and now to this list of rare distinctions she adds the proud honor of having been first at Manila, through the ves sel that bore her capital's name! We congratulate you, gentlemen, that you have the privilege of manning a vessel named for the capital of a State upon whose standards the eagles of victory perch and upon whose banners there is no stain. We congratulate ourselves, on the other hand, that the vessel dearer than all others to North Carolina hearts is manned by such brave and such noble men. We are proud that it was given to "our ves-sel" to be the leader in the greatest naval victory in all the annals of war. We are proud of the vessel that fired the first shot at the yellow flag of Spanish despotism in far off Manila bay. We are proud of the captain that commanded her. Though others may misunderstand him or purposely malign his name, the citizens of Raleigh will stand behind him in all that he has done. And we are proud of the men that he commanded, the men be-

Dewey, than whom no greater ever lived-but as great as either were the We are proud of this trophy that you've brought us, telling as it does of the matchless valor of American hearts and the deathless glory of American arms. We are proud that it is a Spanish gun. We promise you that it shall be the only Spanish thing in town. Until recently our city colors were yellow and red, but we've changed them now. They looked too much like Spaniards or smallpoxone as bad as the other-and we didn't want either one. So we have changed them and they are now white and red-the colors of Sir Walter Raleigh. And in this connection it gives me pleasure to say to you, captain, and to your brave men, that we now have in course of manufacture a handsome flag of the new city colors. which shall bear the coat-of-arms of the State, and which upon its completion we shall tender to you as some
