Col. O'Beirne, who some months ago vainly sought recognition as a diplo matic representative of the Boer republics, yesterday appeared at the State Department in the interest of the three delegates. Col. O'Beirne has previously had a short talk with the President, who di-

rected him to the State Department. Secretary Hay listened to the reasons why the United States government should act to bring the war to a close. Col. O'Beirne, like the Boer delegates, felt that the mere direction of the United States would suffice to induce England to cease hostilities. He argued with a good deal of eloquence, but without convincing the officials that the United States government could intervene in the manner proposed without becoming at once involved as as party to the war.

The Government Will Not Intervene.

It can be set down as certain that the present determination of our government is not to request England to stop the war. The credentials of the Boer delegates




