

The Ministers insist Upon Conditions as to Penalties—Many Lawless Acts by Soldiers of Allied Forces.

By Telegram to the Morning Star. PARIS, January 23.—The Havas Agency has received the following dispatch from Pekin, under date of January 22:

"The ministers have decided not to reply to the request for exchanges of their joint note until the Chinese shall have proved by their acts that they intend to give satisfaction and the conditions shall have been accepted as to the primary question of punishment. The ministers intend to discuss with 'Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang the onerous conditions which the chief of the guilty shall be punished."

Many Lawless Acts. THIRTEEN, Friday, January 18.—Two deserters from the American army recently committed acts of depredation in the surrounding country and have been captured. The villagers, both were captured, but one succeeded in making his escape and is still at large. It is probable that they will be shot. Three Sikhs, who were found guilty of similar acts, were also captured. The other two deserters to-day and given fifty lashes each. Many lawless acts are being committed. THE NATION IN MOURNING.

Last Moments of Queen Victoria—Words of Farewell to Members of Her Family—Will Be Buried at Frogmore Beside Prince Consort.

By Cable to the Morning Star. OSBORNE HOUSE GATES, ISLE OF WIGHT, January 23, 7.05 P. M.—When the following bulletin announced that the Queen was sinking all the waters at the gates of Osborne House made up their minds to remain to the end. The cold was intense and a few favored ones sought shelter in the royal lodge, just inside, where they waited in absolute silence. The telephone bell rang at 7.04 P. M., but before a royal servant had time to take the message the chief of the Queen's police emerged from the darkness and with barred head said: "The Queen has passed away at 6.30."

All present reverently uncovered and then shrill whistles and the ringing of bells of the acetylene lamps waiting for the signals for messengers to race to Cowes with the news. In a few moments the place was deserted. Suddenly mounted messengers, on white horses, dashed from Osborne.

On arrival at Cowes the carriages found the news known both at the railway station and at the gates before it had been announced to those waiting.

Cowes, Jan. 22.—The Queen is said to have bid farewell in feeble monosyllabic words to the French king and her beside at midday. She first recognized the Prince of Wales, to whom she spoke a few words of great moment; then Emperor William and the other present. Her last words were whispered good bye. All those in the bedroom were in tears.

With the members of the royal family gathered at the Queen's bedside, the Bishop of Winchester and the rector of Whippingham read prayers for those in extremis. Vigorously Denounced in the Senate in a Brilliant Speech by Senator Vest.

ATTACKED NAVIGATION LAWS

By Telegram to the Morning Star. WASHINGTON, January 23.—Consideration of the shipping subsidy bill was resumed this afternoon by the Senate. It was made the unfinished business, thus restoring it to its privileged position.

Senator Vest, Missouri, took the floor immediately and in a characteristic, brilliant, forceful and interesting speech, lasting nearly three hours, he vigorously attacked the navigation laws of the United States, holding that they were responsible for the decadence of the merchant marine of America.

Senator Rawlins, Democrat, Utah, precipitated a lively colloquy by charging that a deal had been struck between the Republican members of the Utah Legislature and certain railroad interests and the officials of the Mormon Church to secure the election of Thomas L. Kearns to the Senate from that State.
