The Kansas, Saloon-Smasher in Chicago, Left for Topeka-Threatens to Return to Chicago.

CHICAGO, February 13.-Mrs. Carrie Nation left Chicago for Topeka to night. She is under bond to appear in the Kansas capital to-morrow for trial in connection with her operations in that city.

Before leaving Chicago she announced that as soon as she had 'cleaned up things" at home she would come back here, and if things were not properly taken care of by the au thorities, she and her friends would take matters into their own hands. Her meeting with the saloon-keepers. which she announced that she would carry out, did not materialize, and in default of having them for an audi ence, she went once more to the saloon at 290 State street, where her, graudson is manager, and delivered a talk there. Mrs. Pryor fought bravely and managed to escape with a cut on the head where she was half stunned by a blow from the lead pipe. She pluckily gave chase and a policeman caught her assailant, who calls himself Patrick Hynes. He was held in \$5,000 bail for trial.


