This is especially true of its iron and steel industries, its cotton planting interests, and its cotton goods m ufactures. Among its industries which protection cannot possibly help may be mentioned its lumber busi ness, the manufacture of forest producis known as naval stores, the growing of rice, the manufacture of could seed oil and other seed pro ducts, its extensive peanut industry in fact, everything or nearly every thing which is distinctly Southern the tariff either affects unfavorably or not at all. It is difficult to see why the South would not prosper in a high degree under as close an approximation to free trade as the necessi ties of national firance permit The fact remains, however, that the tariff sentiment in the South is gaining strength, and since in New Eng land it is as steadily weakening, a nat ural but probably incorrect explanation of the phenomenon is that offered by a Southern man a few days ago, to the effect that, as the South and New England had always thought differently on every subject of common in terest, it was bound to do so in this in stance, even though New England was right and the South mistaken "


