For some time past the comparative shallow depth of the water at the various ports of the sea of Azof has attracted the serious attention of the Russian government. First class steamers cannot secure proper accommodation, with the result that cargoes have to be unloaded by lighters, thus incurring great expense and delay. The strait of Kertch is only about fortyfive feet in depth. At Tagonrog the

The Russian government has sought to overcome the difficulty by dredging the various ports, but the results achieved are disappointing. The authorities now propose, according to The Scientific American, to construct a barrage across the strait of Kertch. thus raising the water level of the sea of Azof. The width of the strait between the Orimean shore and the Tusla promontory is 10,823 feet, but of this total width only a little over 4,000 feet, giving an average depth of twenty-seven feet, can be utilized. The construction of an embankment 51,480 feet in length is now contemplated, which will provide several large central basins with sufficient depth of water to perous future. accommodate large first class steam-

The total cost of the scheme is estimated at 9,800,000 rubles, approximately one-third of which will be expended as compensation to private individuals. The authorities propose to recoup themselves, however, by the levy of dues upon all ships passing through the strait. The completion of such a scheme will tend materially to increase the shipping traffic with the Azof ports.






