In Fayetteville, the dryer the ground the better, as the soil fills in round the roots closer and lighter, without that packing which takes place in wet weather.

To plant a tree or shrub, dig a large hole and fill with soil rich enough to grow good corn. The best compost is a mixture of yellow clay, decomposed vegetable matter, and a little ashes or lime. Always plant figs and other tender trees on the North side of a fence or house, as it is not the cold but the sudden changes that injure them.
